


THE BRENNAN FAMILY

Edward Brennan along with wife Esther (Connell) and three year old daughter Catherine, arrived on the ship *Fortune* into Moreton Bay on 8th December 1855.

Edward was born in Queens County (now known as Laois), and Esther was born in Dublin.

They married at a small place called Chapelizod, just outside Dublin. Catherine was also born at Chapelizod.

Their only son Edward was born in Ipswich in 1857 and daughter Mary was born in Brisbane in 1860.

The family then travelled to the Calliope district about 1861 where Edward was employed as a shepherd on Stowe Station. The family lived on Sheep Station Hill, so called because the sheep were herded to the hill at night and guarded by the shepherds against dingo attacks.

Another two daughters were born in Calliope, Winnifred about 1864 and Esther in 1865.

Esther Brennan was the first person to discover gold in the Calliope district. She apparently picked up a large rock to use as a door stop until she was advised it contained gold. The place where she collected the rock from is still called Brennan's Flats, which is situated just below Sheep Station Hill.

Edward died of consumption on 8th January 1868 aged 47 years and is buried in the Gladstone Cemetery.

Life would have been very tough for Esther with such a young family, and no widow's pension, and she consequently married William Ramsden a short time later.

Esther worked in Calliope as a midwife and even delivered her grandson, John Francis Brennan, who was born at Kroombit Station where her son Edward was working. My grandfather spoke fondly of his grandmother. She apparently made up little muslin bags of sugar, and if ever he was in trouble or upset, he would be given a bag to suck on.

The Brennan children married into the Kirkpatrick, Ashman and Kelly families, with youngest daughter Esther marrying into the Mylne family only to pass away a short time later from convulsions.

Esther lived at both Gladstone and Calliope during her life time, and passed away 28th February 1893 aged 66 years. She is buried at the Calliope Cemetery.

WILLIAM KIRKPATRICK

William Kirkpatrick was born 5th November 1819 in Belfast Northern Ireland.

During 1838 William was arrested and tried for stealing silk handkerchiefs. He received a seven year sentence for his crime and arrived in Sydney aboard the ship *Elphingstone* on 29th December 1838.

On 7th July 1845 William gained his freedom. His convict record stated his occupation was labourer, but on his arrival at Port Curtis in 1854, his occupation was carpenter.

William and his partner Matilda (Taylor) lived at Barney Point where first child, daughter Emma was born. Four more children, James, Matilda, John Brice, and Fanny were born in Gladstone, while youngest Edward, was born at Mt. Alma just outside Calliope.

With the release of freehold land for sale in Gladstone William purchased a block of land in Auckland Street on 26th September 1855 for ten pounds ten shillings. Life would have been pretty tough for these early pioneers, especially the women and children.

Around 1872 the family moved to the Calliope Diggings where William became the local Undertaker, and sometimes shepherd.

The Kirkpatrick children attended the new Calliope School and later on daughter Matilda became an assistant teacher at the school.

Mary Black of Calliope donated a block of land for a church. The Church of England, Presbyterian Church and Salvation Army combined and the Union Church was built on the site.

This church was built by William and was of slab walls and shingle roof construction. In 1910 a new church was built on the same site and was built by Williams' son John Brice. The church is still standing today and is used by Church of England and Presbyterian worshippers.

The children of William and Matilda married into the Brennan, Rennie, Reddicliffe, Templeton, and Paterson families, many of whose descendants are still residing in the area today.

William and Matilda lived out the rest of their days at Calliope. Matilda passed away 18th November 1890 and William on 22nd December 1906 aged 87 years. Both are buried in the Calliope Cemetery.

SMITH FAMILY

Emma Victoria ALLEN was born in Tuam, Galway, Ireland, about September 1845, the daughter of John Allen and Catherine Kennedy. Her mother, Catherine, died on 20 June 1848. Several of Emma's elder siblings emigrated to Australia and it seems her father waited for his younger children to finish their schooling, before he too decided to make the voyage to Australia. The family arrived in Brisbane on the *Jessie Munn* on 26 January, 1862. Emma's elder brother Thomas was already settled in Drayton Qld and this is where John and the family headed.

On 5 July 1866 at Drayton Qld, Emma married Frederick Smith, the son of William Smith and Hannah Trotman of Gloucestershire, England. They continued to live in that area, some of their children being born at Toowoomba and Ipswich Qld.

In the 1870's the family moved to Gladstone Qld where there were some further increases in the family. Frederick Smith began a bakery and once again operated an aerated water works business in Goondoon Street as he had in Drayton. The Smith family bakery operated in Gladstone from this date until 1948 as the descendants of this couple have remained in the area, their children and grandchildren being involved in the early development of Gladstone.

One of the establishments which has been considered an important part of the area's heritage, is the Clyde Hotel, which has been moved to the Port Curtis Historical Village site on the banks of the Calliope River. Members of the Smith family obtained the licence of this old drover's pub at the beginning of the First World War when it was in its original location at Burua. Wet bags were thrown over the old wooden kegs in an effort to keep the contents cool as there was never any electricity at the old Hotel.

Emma Victoria Smith, the matriarch of this Gladstone family, died in Gladstone on 2 December 1919 and is buried in the Gladstone Cemetery.

VALLIS FAMILY

Mary Guinay was born in Tipperary, Ireland around 1845, the daughter of Patrick Guinay and Margaret Kelly.

In Gladstone Queensland in 1869, Mary married Abel Vallis, son of John Vallis and Martha Dyke, who was born about 1838 in Somerset England.

Abel had arrived in South Australia in about 1857, however he only spent a short time in that state before moving into Victoria where he spent some time around the goldfields. Around 1866 the news of the gold discoveries in the Gladstone district must have enticed Abel and his brother Valentine to make the long overland trip from Victoria to the Calliope Gold Diggings where Abel was to open the first general store.

Life on the goldfields was primitive in these early times and especially so for mothers trying to raise families. Mary Vallis had her first son in 1870 and altogether she and Abel raised a family of 5 boys and 2 girls.

Abel continued to be very much involved in the community, helping to get the first school started and being a member of the Calliope Divisional Board when it was first proclaimed in 1879.

In the 1880's the family moved into Gladstone and they owned the Free Trade Store in Glenlyon Street. Still committed to the community Abel was mayor of Gladstone in 1887-88. Sometime later the family owned a property in the Mount Larcom area known as "Vallis Vale".

Mary Vallis died in Gladstone Qld on 20 Jan 1899, however, she is remembered by many family members who have remained in the district. Her grandson Dr Val Vallis wrote many poems and songs about this area and his family in particular.

Golden Wedding - 1927

Mr. and Mrs Johnson of Beecher near Gladstone Transcribed from an article in a 1927 Gladstone newspaper. Italics indicate missing or illegible words.



On Saturday, September 10,

Mr. and Mrs. John P. Johnson, of the Station House.

Mr. Johnson, now 77 years of age, was born on the 11th December, 1850, in Copenhagen, Denmark, and Mrs. Johnson, now 70 years of age, was born on the 25th July, 1857, in Christiana, now Oslo, Norway.

Mr John P Johnson had just left the Danish army, where he served for 14 years, as a non-commissioned officer, decided to try his luck in Australia, and with such object in view, proceeded to Hamburg to join the ship **Humbolt**, which at this time was loading locomotives at Liverpool, England, for the Queensland railways.

During the 11 days stay there he acted as interpreter at the depot in the English, German, Norwegian and Danish language, and was finally appointed as chief constable, schoolmaster and purser's assistant for the voyage, for which he was paid £11 on arrival in Brisbane.

During the voyage he got acquainted with a young girl from Norway, who also intended to join the ship for Queensland to go to her married sister in Gladstone (Mrs. Christie Jensen, now of "Grevillia Farm," Taragoola). This acquaintance ripened into something stronger during the voyage. They became engaged and upon the day of arrival were married.

On arrival in Gladstone, about a week after, they settled there and Mr. Johnson joined the pilot schooner "Enid under pilot George Seeds," under whom he served twice. Mr. and Mrs. Johnson afterwards went North and took up land on the Daintree River, where Mrs. Johnson was the first white woman settler. The blacks at that time were treacherous and often troublesome.

The anticipated prosperity of the North got a severe blow when the Kanaka labour was stopped by Sir Samuel Walter Griffith, with the result that many hardy pioneers were ruined and left for less hazardous occupations. However Mr. Johnson entered into the timber getting industry, as *many* species of red, white, pencil and acacia cedar, as well as beech, yellow wood bean wood and other valuable timber grew in abundance on the river, which found a ready market *at* Townsville *and Rockhampton*. *Another sentence is missing here. They decided to move further south*. Shortly after arrival another little girl died. *Mrs Johnson* luckily kept in health, but *Mr* Johnson although never laid up *with* the malady, was far from well, and only recovered completely after a long sea-trip and change of climate obtained by his service with the Queensland contingents in the South African War. He went to South Africa twice and served till the end of the war. He also served during the Great War, doing staff duty, he never got the chance to go to the front. His youngest son, a Lewis Gunner, was killed in Flanders.

One daughter (Mrs. Range), lives in Cairns and the other daughter, Mrs. E.J. Kirkwood lives at Beecher, and three married sons in Brisbane suburbs. The Gladstone Observer, 27th July, 1935:

A pretty wedding was celebrated at the Town Hall, Mt. Larcom, when Alma Grace, eldest daughter of Mr. and Mrs. J. C. Goody, Mt. Larcom, was married to Albert Victor, third son of the late Mr. and Mrs. J. Ellison (New Zealand).

Rev. R. Crook officiated at the ceremony.

The dainty little bride, who was given away by her father, looked charming in an ivory satin frock cut on figure-fitting lines. The back fell into a long sweeping train, and the bodice featured cowl sleeves and a hand-worked lace yoke.

A diamante buckle completed the waistline, and a string of crystals was worn. Her beautiful embroidered veil of white tulle fell in billowy folds from a silver lace cap, held in place with a coronet of orange blossoms.

She carried a shower bouquet of roses and lilies of the valley, arranged with tulle.

Miss Barbara (Bonnie) Lutton, cousin of the bride, was the attendant bridesmaid. She was daintily dressed in an anklelength frock of blue satin striped crepe, made in the tunic style and finished with a sequin bow and a blue posy.

Her silk taffeta Dolly Varden bonnet was tied with blue satin ribbon, which reached the hem of her frock. She carried a shower bouquet of pale pink roses and chrysanthemums, tied with blue ribbon.

Little Miss Abby Lutton, cousin of the bride, attended as flower girl, and looked very pretty in an ankle-length rose pink georgette Empire frock with pink ribbon falling from the bodice to the hem of the frock, and a large frilled cape and puff sleeves.

She also wore a wreath of pink flat flowers, and she carried a basket of roses and asparagus fern, with a pink bow.

The duties of best man were carried out by Mr. Allen Goody, brother of the bride.

The hall where the ceremony took place was tastefully decorated by Mrs. Jack Lutton and friends of the bride.

The chief feature of the decorations was a white trellis, with trails of morning glory in shades of blue, and pink roses and asparagus fern.

The guest pews were marked with silver horseshoes, morning glory, pink roses and bows of white ribbon, and a large wedding bell was suspended over the bridal group.

As the bridal party entered the hall the congregation sang "The Voice That Breathed 0'er Eden ".

Mrs. Bliss presided at the piano, and while the register was being signed Mrs. Bliss sang "Because."

The bride's sister (Miss Jean Orr) as bridesmaid, wore ice blue moss crepe with shirred bishop sleeves and a cowl neckline. Her matching hat was in the bonnet mode. Mr. John King was the best man.

The reception was held at Lennon's, where asters and carnations formed the floral decorations.

Mrs. Orr's gown of black dull crepe had an ermine collar, and was worn with a velour hat.

Mrs. B. J. Shaw chose black marocain, patterned in red, with a black straw hat.

On leaving the reception the bride wore a squirrel fur coat, the gift of her mother.

The death has occurred of Mr George Ferguson, fourth son of the late Mr. and Mrs. G. Ferguson, Castle Hope Station. Born at Canberra Station in 1877, he married Miss Ellen Jane Williams, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. G. Williams of Monal in 1904. The couple lived at Tableland and Tanginnie, and came to live at Calliope 28 years ago.

Deceased was a keen prospector and followed mining for many years. He is survived by the widow, two sons, Messrs. A.V. Ferguson, Calliope and CL. Ferguson, Railway Department, Gladstone, and two daughters, Mesdames Stanley Brown and R. E. Brown, both of Calliope. He also leaves four brothers and three sisters.

Mrs. Amelia FERGUSON

Mrs Amelia Ferguson, one of the oldest pioneers of Miriam Vale, died in the Gladstone Private Hospital on July 31, aged 81. Born in Devonshire England she was a young girl when she arrived in Australia with her parents Mr and Mrs Ducham.

She was married in Maryborough in 1878 to James Ferguson who also came from Northumberland, England. They arrived in Miriam Vale in 1899 from Maryborough where they took up a selection. Mrs. Ferguson resided there to the time of her death. Her husband predeceased her 11 years ago.

Two sons saw service in the Great War. In the early days she was known far and wide as a nurse. She used to travel on horseback as far as Many Peaks and Cania to attend cases. Distance was no object.

She is survived by three sons, Charles and William, Miriam Vale, and John, of Barmundu, also seven daughters, Mrs Ducham and Mrs. Vallis, Nagoorin, Mrs. Clark, Gympie, Mrs. Kirkpatrick Wondai, Mrs. Bates, Yeppoon, Mrs Mortensen and Mrs. Goody, Miriam Vale, two brothers and three sisters, and 50 grandchildren and 35 great-grandchildren.

BDN&M 12 Aug 1941

Mervyn Alfred Charles BOYLE -QX2920

Mervyn Boyle of "Kia-ora" at Yarwun was a "rat" and he was proud of it. Mervyn, who died suddenly at the Greenslopes Repatriation Hospital on July 29, was a Rat of Tobruk, who helped hold Tobruk against tremendous odds under constant attack during World War Two. "They held it for six months with little food and great hardship" his sister Hazel recalled. "In idle moments they planned excellent meals they would have if they ever got back to Cairo". "When that finally happened, their stomachs had shrunk and they could eat little of the good food on offer". "In Tobruk, they were referred to by the Germans as "rats" because they were forced to live under ground and forage for food". "Later they bore the title 'Rats of Tobruk' proudly indeed."

Mervyn was born on August 9, 1916 and apart from five years war service, spent the whole of his 82 years at "Kia-ora". He had a great love of and feeling for the land, horses and cattle. In 1939, he joined the AIF and in 1940 sailed for England as Australian troops were sent to bolster the depleted British Army after the evacuation from Dunkirk. Mervyn and his mates also helped evacuate people on the nights of the German aerial blitz on London.

Early in 1941, the 2/32nd Battalion AIF was formed in England, made up of men from various Australian states. They were sent to help hold Tobruk. Mervyn and his 2/32nd mates also fought the successful battle of El Alamein after which he was posted as "missing — possibly a prisoner of war". His family was notified. "But Mervyn had told us he had a return ticket and we were not to worry about him," Hazel said. "We worried but he was right. He and a few of his mates were cut off but fought their way back to their battalion."

At home, he was a Calliope Shire councillor, chairman of directors of the local fruit growers' co-operative and on the School of Arts Committee. He attended the first meeting of Westowe Rural Fire Brigade in 1954, was appointed fire warden and served for 31 years. In 1985 he was presented a national medal for almost half a century of meritorious service to the brigade, his community and the state.

In 1963 he married Joyce Procter and another house was built at Yarwun. Joyce died in 1990.

Early in 1997, Mervyn sold his house and land and went to Cleveland to live with his step-sons. Always a keen horseman — as a child and in his teens he regularly competed in riding and hunting events at the Gladstone shows—he immediately joined a riding school. He attended regularly for two hours each Saturday and made many friends. His funeral was held on 31 July 1998.

Gladstone Observer 1998

The 1921 Census of England and Wales, will be published online by Findmypast in January 2022.

<u>Findmypast</u> has been selected as <u>The National Archives</u>' commercial partner to make the <u>1921 Census of England & Wales</u> available online. The project will see Findmypast capture digital images and transcribe the records in a way that will enable family historians across the globe to conduct meaningful searches of these important records when they are opened for the very first time.

Taken on 19th June 1921, the census consists of more than 28,000 bound volumes of original household returns containing detailed information on close to 38 million individuals.


It provides greater detail than any previous census as, in addition to the questions asked in 1911, the 1921 returns also asked householders to reveal their place of employment, the industry they worked in and the materials they worked with as well as their employer's name.

Those aged 15 and older were required to provide information about their marital status, including if divorced, while for those under 15 the census recorded whether both parents were alive or if either or both had died.

The 1921 Census also included detailed questions on education, and was the first in which individual householders could submit separate confidential returns.

Tamsin Todd, CEO of Findmypast, says: "This announcement is important for all family historians tracing their ancestors living in Britain in the early twentieth century. It provides a fascinating snapshot of how people lived and worked in the years following World War 1, and it's all the more important because there's no surviving census for the next two decades until 1951."

Pete Benton, Census Operations Director at The Office for National Statistics, said: "The 1921 Census records are a unique opportunity to uncover details of how your family lived and worked in a period of massive socioeconomic change in post-World War One Britain. ** NEW PUBLICATION ** BOYNE VALLEY CEMETERY INDEX Burial Records

Boyne Valley Cemetery Index: includes Nagoorin, Many Peaks, Norton burials in cemeteries





Launched at the 35th birthday celebrations of the Genealogical Society Gladstone District on Saturday 22 September 2019, the Boyne Valley Cemetery Index is a new publication for the Society put together over the last twelve months by member, Paulette Flint, from death records originally compiled by Life Member, Melva Bensted.

This index incorporates burial records for the three cemeteries in the Boyne Valley district of Gladstone Regional Council, Nagoorin Cemetery, Norton Cemetery and Many Peaks/Builyan Cemetery. All these cemeteries are now closed for burial. Nagoorin Cemetery received a facelift in 2018 with new fences and a plaque listing burials placed in the cemetery. The Norton Cemetery is not maintained by Gladstone Regional Council.

The Many Peaks Cemetery is erroneously entitled Builyan Cemetery both on the signage at the cemetery and on the Gladstone Regional Council website. Originally, It was the Many Peaks Cemetery, although some burial records in the index state Builyan Cemetery. It should be more correctly named, Builyan/Many Peaks Cemetery, or Many Peaks/Builyan Cemetery. It is situated in the Builyan locality.

Some 186 burials are listed in the index which was taken from the original death records of the Gladstone District Court.

The records include: Surname, First Names, Sex, Age, Occupation, Death Date, Death Place, Burial Place and Parents' names. Parents' names were taken from the Queensland Birth Death and Marriage Index online, and thus may include their transcription errors. Where no parents were mentioned, the records annotate "Unknown" or "Unnamed".

It also includes: The whole index in PDF format, plus available photographs of the remaining headstones and some other cemetery photographs, stories taken from newspaper articles, a map of grave locations in Many Peaks Cemetery, information about each Cemetery and some death certificates, all on a USB stick.

Postage of a USB stick is much cheaper than the cost of a printed copy. It is \$20, plus postage and packing if posted.




