### **President's Report**

#### Rob Walker – Member No. 696

As we embark on another year our resolution is to continue helping find family history links for our members as well as taking enquiries from far afield, which all add up to new directions for those looking to tick off boxes in paper trails or databases. We are confident for that task by virtue of the number of great people we have behind the scenes doing book indexing or newspaper clippings that add into the rapid surname search program.

We had our first general meeting of the year in January, our regular Book Night, and even though attendance was light on, the subject matter was very interesting in line with standards set over previous years. Again, we face the conundrum of what subject matter will encourage better attendance and save face for ourselves if we only muster small numbers for invited speakers. Such speakers will always be able to present different insights on family history from which we can all learn.

The place our Family History Society holds in the wider historical context was brought home recently when the article on Genealogy Software from last October's issue written by our own Committee member Rex Stanton, was picked up by the Ballarat Family History Society. They sought permission to use that material by asking if Rex would be available to do a Zoom link for one of their future meetings on that topic. How good is that?

I made mention at the AGM last September that we have become custodians of the 'Pastoral Review' collection (1893-1977) from CSU Archives as a result of their relocation. That has now been catalogued and I note that we hold some 750 monthly volumes or 72% of the total printed. There are a number of missing issues, even complete years are not available, so we are in the hunt for missing volumes that might still be out there. In addition to the magazines, we also received suitable shelving which fits with the rest of the library. Many of the Reviews are over 100 years old and therefore quite fragile. With that in mind the whole collection will only be available for research within our rooms in order to preserve what we can.

As well as the task of part indexing each issue for references to Southern NSW, from this outstanding historical record, we have concentrated on a photo collection of First World War Volunteers from the monthly issues for the period 1914-1919. Over 1350 individual photos of soldiers, and 14 nursing sisters, will be made available by Anzac Day as a separate index.

With all this going on we need help from members who have some spare time for a variety of jobs that are collateral to our normal duties.

Welcome to 2023. As we commence another year, I wish everyone great success with their family history research and hoping that some amazing new discoveries are made by our members!

On page 13 of this issue of the *Murrumbidgee Ancestor* is the third in the series of Geoff Haddin's Monument Cards in memory of the deaths of various members of his family. David Parkin tells the story on page 17 of the hard and difficult life of someone married into his family.

Two new family history books have come to my notice in the last few months. Lorna Nixon has written a book on families at Stockinbingal, near Cootamundra. The title is *Stockinbingal: Our Family Stories*. This book includes Lorna's research plus contributions from 80 families who have ancestors or relatives at Stockinbingal. The cost is \$45.00, plus postage, and can be purchased at the Heritage Centre, Stockinbingal, Australia Post, Stockinbingal, or the Cootamundra Newsagency. The 2nd book is *Young Pioneers, The lives of Peter John Rhall and Mary Ann Canfield: their Story and Their Descendants* by Travyn Rhall. A hardcover edition, 400 pages. Peter John Rhall settled at Young NSW, in the 1860s. His sister, Catherine Rhall, who was murdered near Beechworth, Victoria, in 1855, was my husband's great-great grandmother. The cost of the book is \$110, plus \$13.50 postage. Travyn can be contacted at travyn.rhall@gmail.com

I have always been interested in the story of Andrew George Scott (better known as Captain Moonlite, the notorious bushranger involved in the siege at Wantabadgery in 1879) and I have recently found that an academic at Charles Sturt University, Dr Matthew Grubit, as part of his thesis towards his studies for a PhD, has investigated how Captain Moonlite's journey from his work as a lay preacher in Victoria led to a life of violent crime - *The Crisis of Captain Moonlite: a case study of unbelief in Colonial Australia* - and can provide insights into people's actions and the religious history of Australia. It is claimed that this research by Dr Grubits is the first extensive study of Scott and the first work to study Scott's religion.

#### SOCIETY HAPPENINGS

Our <u>September</u> meeting was the Annual General Meeting with the usual cold weather. However, the election of office bearers was successfully conducted and we are ready for another year of working on family research and collecting records to be useful for this subject.

As we have not been getting attendance numbers at our meetings, we are continuing with general information and no guest speakers. In <u>October</u> Chairman Neil gave information from our newsletter to keep members up to date, and Leanne gave a rundown on all our present and future projects which will provide members and others with help towards their research. The latest project involves indexing our collection of "Pastoral Review" magazines which were donated to our Society by Charles Sturt University Archives. These magazines contain great details about rural families, properties etc., and there are photographs of World War 1 military and nurses.

Ongoing projects are: newspaper clippings; indexing of local history books; Catholic burials; Alan Harris McDonald funeral files; Births, Deaths & Marriages from the "Daily Advertiser" (a CD will be released soon of 25 years with over 48,000 records); digitisation of a collection of Narrandera newspapers which we hold; collecting house names from the older houses in Wagga. We may need another 100 years to finish all this work!

We had a successful working bee in <u>November</u>, and our back shed is tidier, some excess papers/files have been organised, and the garden looks better too (especially since our expert gardener Col has returned and mowed our lawn). Of course, there is always more to be done.

Member Geoff Burch gave a talk on Wagga Showground at the <u>November</u> meeting. He has researched the first 20 years (from 1885) and will do more when the CSU Archives opens after its move to the North Campus of the University. However, he has many photographs of different years of the show buildings and the show itself, and we were all very interested in his presentation. We didn't realise that there used to be a rail siding adjoining the show-ground for transport of animals for display. Geoff is asking if anyone has photos of the show-ground at any time which he could borrow and copy.

On 19 November member Robyn Jessiman and I were invited to speak about family history at a CWA gathering. We had a very pleasant afternoon, and people seemed interested in what we had to say.

Of course, <u>December</u> is our Christmas party, and 24 members and guests enjoyed a very pleasant evening. Chefs Rob and John did a very good job with the barbecue, and many thanks to members who supplied so many different and yummy salads and sweets. A great night! We also drew our Christmas raffle – first prize going to Susan and Tony Salmon (Journal Editor Marcia McIntyre's friends) and second prize to a long-standing member Bill Weir. Thank you to everyone who participated in the raffle.

Our Book Night in January was not well attended, but I think those who came enjoyed getting together. There was a wide variety of books, from a Time book of photographs; to Octavia Hill who began the National Trust in England and was instrumental in poor relief; Australian and English army uniforms and information; Henry Lawson's stay in Bourke NSW; a modern murder story; the Reid family history; and a couple of local histories which have just been donated to our library.

### NOTES FROM WAGGA WAGGA

In the latest Alan Harris McDonald funeral files that I have been indexing, I have come across some eulogies, some of these have been published in the Wagga Wagga Daily Advertiser in the deceased's obituary. This one is the Eulogy of Kathleen Margaret TOY nee HEWETT, wife of Cecil TOY a renowned hotel owner in Wagga Wagga. Cecil & Kath had no children. Cecil died at Wagga on the 23 October 1995. The author is unknown, written in April 1995. (Transcribed as is & not edited)

### **KATHLEEN MARGARET TOY**

Mrs **Kathleen Margaret Toy** arrived in Wagga Wagga in 1939 with husband Cecil where they purchased the **Wagga Hotel** and in 1941 the **Australian Hotel** was acquired and the Toys began their contributions to community affairs in Wagga Wagga.

Kath will be remembered for her contribution to the cultural life of Wagga Wagga, particularly in the field of music.

She was a pianist and organist, giving freely of her time, talent and support to many ventures. She played the Hammond organ at the Civic Theatre for Civic and special occasions, including the reception for the then **Prime Minister of Australia, Malcolm Fraser** in 1977.

During the 1970s, Kath played an organ (lent by **Palings**) for the **Children's Theatre Workshop Christmas Productions** held outside in the **Civic Theatre Gardens**.

For several years during the 1980s, Kath played the organ during the intermissions of the Annual Productions of the **Inland Ballet Co.** 

The organ in **Joye's Hall at Charles Sturt University** (A gift from Cecil and Kath Toy) bears her name in honour of her contribution to music.


She was for many years a patron and later a life member of the Wagga Wagga Eisteddfod Society. During those years she donated the "Kathleen Toy Trophy" for the Amateur Champion Piano Solo (Open) Section at the Eisteddfod.

A much admired painting of "Katarina and Bianca" (two Shakespearian Characters) hangs in the upper foyer at the Civic Theatre, a contribution from Cecil and Kath Toy.

Kath was a regular Theatre goer, always supportive of drama, music and ballet productions presented in Wagga Wagga. Whilst touring Europe in 1968 she visited our **Sister City of Nordlingen** and became a good friend of **Burgomaster Kessler**, she was the first lady visitor from Wagga Wagga.

Kath was born in Bordertown SA on 27/1/1907, she married Cecil Toy in Bordertown on 1/9/33 and died in Wagga Wagga on 21/4/95 aged 88 years.

### **Mourning Cards - No. 3**

The Mourning Card No. 3 is interesting as it is bewildering. It is a card totally black with gold writing and the word "Anastacia" emblazoned across its centre.

The Pratt photograph album, I believe, was put originally together by Mrs. Mary Pratt, wife of William Henry Pratt of "East Lynne" in the Winchendon Vale area. Mary, unfortunately passed away on the 18 July, 1906, aged 36 years, after having given birth to a daughter Edith M. The relationship between the Gardner family and the Pratt family is unknown but the fact that this Mourning Card has a place in the Pratt photographic album is a mystery.


Anastacia Gardner was the wife of Frank William Gardner, a train driver from the Junee Locomotive Depot, which was, at this time, located just across the road from the Union Club Hotel (now known as the Red Cow) in Junee. Anastacia passed away under suspicious circumstances on the 12 February, 1906 aged 23 years.

The passing of Anastacia made news in various publications in the area including Gundagai, *Wagga Wagga Express, Cootamundra Herald* and *Wagga Advertiser*.

An abridged version of the Inquest into the mysterious death at Junee of Anastacia Gardner was published in the *Wagga Wagga Advertiser*, Thursday 1 March, 1906.

"The inquest concerning the death of Anastacia Gardner, who died mysteriously at the local hospital recently, was concluded today, before Mr. Coroner Scobie and the following jury: - Messrs. W. Meldrum, W.J. Hiscock, W.J. Wheatley, G.W. Scrivener, A.H. Knott and A. Duckworth. The Government analyst's report showed that he had found half a grain of strychnine in the stomach of deceased, which had been sent to him for analysis. The evidence of Dr. Burgess, Government Medical Officer, of Wagga, who made the post-mortem. The Coroner having summed up, the jury retired at 1.15.pm. and, after an hour's absence, brought in the following verdict. 'We find Anastacia Garner, in the State of New South Wales, wife of F.W. Garner, Junee, aforesaid, aged 23 years, met her death on Monday, 12<sup>th</sup> February, 1906, while an inmate of the Junee Hospital, in New South Wales, from poison (strychnine) administered to the said Anastacia Garner by Nurse Single on 12<sup>th</sup> February, 1906 at 9.40.pm. and further consider that Nurse Single was guilty of negligence in using a glass without first washing it, the said glass having been previously used, and that the negligence does not in our opinion amount to manslaughter. We also find that the matron of the Junee Hospital (Miss Mitchell) was guilty of negligence in leaving a dirty glass on the dispensary without washing it after having used the said glass to measure liquor strychnine. We further find that in the opinion of negligence of the matron does not amount to manslaughter. We wish to add the following rider:- That we consider the custom of leaving used and unused glasses on the same table in the dispensary dangerous and should be abolished.'

(It should be explained that the deceased met her death by being given medicine measured in a glass which previously had strychnine in it.)"

Anastacia Gardner (nee Frankcom) born Wagga Wagga 1883) was in hospital being treated for typhoid. Her sudden passing left a husband with two children, Evelyn Francis and Leslie.

Frank William Gardner was born on the 23 July, 1882 and rose to the rank of train driver at the age of 21 years of age. Frank was the engine driver of the special train that did the stress test on the railway bridge at Gundagai on Thursday 2 April 1903. To be an engine driver at such a young age is an accomplishment in itself.

Frank Gardner remarried on the Wednesday 15 July, 1908 to Miss Maud Lovelock in the Presbyterian Church, Junee. The married couple, as was customary of the day, left by mail train for their honeymoon.

The retirement of Frank Gardner in August, 1942 brought to an end a successful career as an engine driver for the New South Wales Government Railways. His meritorious service bought about him being a recipient of the Imperial Service Medal (also known as the Kings Medal) in 1943, but one can assume the presentation in September, 1944 would have brought about by World War 2.

The presentation of the Imperial Service Medal was made by 2<sup>nd</sup> Baron Wakehurst (Rt. Hon. John de Vere Loder), KG. KCMG. also referred in the press as Lord Wakehurst. Contrary to the publication in the Wagga Wagga Daily Advertiser, Tuesday, September 26<sup>th</sup>, 1944 the presentation was conducted at Government House in Sydney. There were, on the day, 160 recipients presented on this day.

### The In-Laws

#### David Parkin—Member No. 810

I have managed to find some information about those who married into the family of Sam and Maria Parkin (my great-grandparents). With help I have been able to put together some of the story of their daughter Ida Parkin. My great-grandfather Sam was building the "Railway Terminus Hotel" at Murchison, Victoria during the 1870's. A young runaway, Alfred Binion, from Melbourne, was among those who came to work there. Eventually Alfred Binion married Mary Ida Parkin (known as Ada, who was born in 1859, at Heathcote, Victoria.



Alfred Binion's early life didn't commence to a good start. As children. Alfred and his three sisters were dumped by their parents and left to fend for themselves. They were placed in an Industrial School. Alfred ran away from there, and made his way to Dargalong (now Murchison East), Victoria. At the time the railway was going through, and the Pub sat on 80 acres, where Sam and Maria Parkin operated the Pub, and buggy hire, and a blacksmith business as well. They need more workers and Alf started working for them. Alf eventually married Sam and Maria Parkin's daughter Mary Ida (Ida) on 13 November, 1876. Actually Mary Ida Parkin was a sister to my grandfather, Robert Haslem Parkin

### **Alfred Binion**

Alf and Ida has 14 children, and a farm at Kyabram, Victoria. This is now run by their great-grandson, Ted Binion and his wife Judy, (who has kindly given me some of the story, which is enclosed).

This is his story:

Alfred was born at Richmond, Victoria in 1858. The story goes that the family lived in a humpy on the banks of the Yarra River somewhere near the Swan Street Bridge. From records obtained from the Victorian Pioneer Index there were four children born to George and Mary Ann Binion who were married at St Georges Church in Melbourne in 1852. George who grew up in Birmingham, England, was sent to Tasmania as a convict in 1848. We are unsure of Mary Ann's heritage as it is very difficult to research a Mary Ann Murphy from Ireland.

So, by default, we find that all the children of George Binion and Mary Ann Murphy were abandoned in an orphanage in South Melbourne. It is only because Sarah Ann died in the industrial home in South Melbourne when she was five years old "with parents unknown" that we knew she at least did not live at Parkin Lane at Richmond for very much of her short life. The information available to us from the Public Records Office did not throw any light as to why the children were left there, and both the parents were still alive at this time. The possibilities are that poverty forced Mary Ann (who by the way was illiterate and 14 years old when she married) and George to leave the children there, and to run away interstate or overseas. As yet we have been unable to find the death certificates of either of these two, although some information received from a researcher in the United Kingdom suggests that George Binion died in 1873, although as yet we know not where. It could be that Mary Anne Murphy and Mary Ann Williams are two different people, further research may determine this for us.

The four children were admitted to the Industrial School where Alfred's youngest sister Sarah Ann died, aged six years. After a time Alfred was moved to another school in Sunbury from which he absconded. Where he went after that, we do not know, but he was only 14 years of age. However, he must have made his way to Dargalong where he met Ida Mary Parkin whom he married on 13 November, 1876. Alfred and Mary subsequently had 14 children. They apparently lived in the area for sometime as nearly all the children were born at Moorilim which is not far from Dargalong or Murchison. They later moved to live at Springhurst and then came back to reside at Wyuna where two of their sons, Samuel James and Robert had selected land.

Alfred died in 1928 at Kyabram and Ida Mary apparently moved to live with her daughter May Merricks at Moonee Ponds where she died on 21 November, 1930. They are both buried in the Kyabram Cemetery. We were unsure where their grave was situated as some records of the cemetery had been destroyed in a fire, but eventually did locate the grave and have since put a marker on it.


