

LFHHS MEMBERS FORUM – E-MAIL DISCUSSION GROUP – GUIDELINES

The Society has provided a members' e-mail discussion group called LFHHS Forum on Groups.io. This replaces the previous Yahoo! Group. The list is restricted to LFHHS members only and is Moderated. Members should note that their email address will be visible on the messages they post, enabling others to reply privately off list.



Joining without an initial invitation

- 1. Go to the website at: https://groups.io/g/LFHHSForum
- 2. OR Download the 'Groups.io' App.
- 3. Click on Subscribe and complete the e-mail template that pops up.
- You are required to have a current e-mail address, to receive e-mails from the Group at your usual address and you will need to set a password.
- 5. An email will open in your browser. Simply request to be a member and click 'Send'
- 6. You will receive an invitation from the Forum.

Joining with an invitation email

- 7. In the email you receive, you will be asked to 'Accept the Invitation'.
- 8. Click on that link and that will establish your link to the Forum.


Once you have joined

- 9. You will receive a standard 'Welcome Message'
- 10. You are now all set to go!
- 11. Your first two email messages to the Forum will be 'Moderated', that is checked for current membership and 'appropriateness' of the email message. After that, your messages will go immediately to the Forum.
- 12. You can see your messages on the web at https://groups.io/g/LFHHSForum/topics



If you download the App and have created a Groups.io account, open the App. All the settings and preferences are set for you.

If you want to modify these in any way. Go to the 'Profile' at the top right of the page, you can change any of those items from the menu on the left. For example, you will be able to choose to receive all emails, a summary of emails or a digest; or change your email address.



Leaving (unsubscribing)

Members can leave the Group by sending an e-mail to: <u>LFFHSForum+unsubscribe@groups.io</u>

Note: If you are just going on holiday you can select an option in your personal settings on the website not to receive e-mails from the Group for the period you are away. When you return you can change the settings back. This saves you having to subscribe again.

Sending a message

You can send a message from your normal email address to: LFHHSForum@groups.io

Always sign off with your full name so that others can identify you, and, if you are making a request for information, your location so answers can be tailored to where you are. You can reply to a Group message in the normal way by using your email 'Reply' function.

NB. As you no doubt appreciate, websites are subject to change and these instructions are current as at December 2020. If you encounter any difficulties with your registration please do not hesitate to contact the LFHHS Group Moderator, by emailing <LFHHSForum+owner@groups.io>.

Sending attachments

There is a self-imposed limit on the size of an attachment of 500kb, but please keep them small. If attaching images, make sure they are Low resolution. Where files are larger than 500kb, Groups.io provides a link to the file.

User Hints

Subject Lines

The subject line should be sufficient to grab the attention of the reader. This will enable them to open the message as potentially interesting or binning the message as unlikely to be of interest.

Subject lines such as "Family History" or "Help" are not good subject lines. A subject line of "SMITH, Chorley, c1850" will attract those who have an interest in that name and place and the message can be safely rejected by those with no interest.

When replying to a message, but changing the topic, please change the subject line to one that is relevant to your message.

Asking for help

When asking for help/advice it would be helpful if your location, e.g., county/country could be mentioned. A member in the locality of the source of information, e.g., local library, will get a different response to those living overseas or the far corners of the UK.

Off-topic Messages

Only subjects that are "on-topic" should be posted to the Forum; i.e., they are about Genealogy or Family History. Messages that are "off-topic" should not be posted to this mailing list, or they may be rejected.

If a topic starts to drift the mailbox moderator will ask for a halt on the topic. Please do not send "Test messages" to the list. Think about the effect with every member on the list getting a message which has no relevance to anyone. If you have something of interest to post, then post that.

Replying to messages

When replying, it is sometimes useful to retain a part of the original message so that other readers can understand the significance of what you are saying. However, please delete what is not relevant and don't allow long strings to develop in individual e-mails. The strings can be viewed on the Group website.

If the topic might be of general interest, please reply to the list as it is likely that others are interested and, more to the point, it will inform others who can provide advice that the query has been dealt with.

Things you may regret saying

Some messages may irritate, although that was not the intention by the writer. The list should not be used for personal criticism or insinuation which may be regretted later. Your email may be rejected.

LFHHS MEMBERS ZOOM MEETINGS GUIDELINES

Zoom enables us to hold and make available, meeting space for formal and informal meetings, live or recorded talks and presentations.

The Society has provided a members' Zoom meeting facility called 'LFHHSZoom' available via your web browser, using a desktop, laptop, tablet or smart phone. Formal presentations can be watched without the facility of a camera, but you will need a speaker, which are standard with a laptop, tablet or smart phone. To participate in a meeting, you will need a microphone; usually built into a tablet and smart phone. Where participants use a desktop without speakers they can join by phone for use of speaker and microphone.

Accessing Zoom Presentations

Zoom Meetings are restricted to LFHHS members only, at the moment, but it is hoped that we can open the space to non-members for talks and presentations, at a cost to them.


Joining via your Browser

When a talk is planned, members will receive an email that gives the following details:

- The date and time of the meeting
- A link to click to join the meeting, when you click on it, you will be taken to the web page where the meeting will be screened.
- A Meeting ID, For example: 220 102 7322

 A 'Passcode', use it like a password to get access to the meeting.


Click on the Link; you receive this screen, or one like it; put in the 'Passcode'; then 'Join Meeting'



Joining via the downloaded Zoom App

For those who are joining Zoom for the first time you may be invited to download the Zoom App. This is the preferred way of joining Zoom meetings.


Open the App



• Click on the 'Join' button



• Enter the 'Meeting ID' from the initial email invitation. Then 'Join'



Clicking on the link will enable you to join the meeting.

 Select if you would like to connect audio and/or video and click 'Join'. On the lower left of the screen there is a small icon for the Camera and Microphone, if there is a redline through either or both, click on them to be sure your camera and microphone are working.

Having joined a Zoom Presentation

- Once you join a formal presentation, please 'Mute' yourself if the Host hasn't already muted everyone. If you wish to contribute you will need to unmute yourself.
- A 'Chat' facility is available for you to pass a message to the Host and other members who have joined the meeting, without interfering with the presentation.
- Presentation copyright remains with the Presenter and you must not record presentations without expressed permission of the Presenter.
- Because you are joining the presentation voluntarily, it is assumed that you give permission for camera and microphone access to you, your home surroundings and your contact details.

STANWORTH NAME ORIGIN

I wish to inform those at the Lancashire Family History and Heraldry Society of a significant find I have made concerning the origin of the surname Stanworth, also my maiden name. I have been helping my cousin Ben Stanworth learn how to

research his genealogy. Although I am not a credentialed genealogist, I have fifty years of work under my belt and have been given the responsibility of continuing the research on mine and my husband's lines from great genealogists who came before us. I learned what I know from doing it the "hard way" before the computer and early, informative workshops when available. I have also helped several individuals find their birth parents due to adoption or estrangement.

I wanted to tell the society of my find as soon as I could get a bit more clarity from the place where I found the name because the book is in Latin. So far I have not been able to locate a translated version of the book. However, I can clearly tell what is being written where I discovered the Stanworth surname. Because Ben has already mentioned to you what I have found I must tell you where I'm at right now. As it is such an important find I wanted to wait until I had it altogether and present it all to you and other societies here in America so it is clear who made the discovery and how.

In 2010 I was able to get my Stanworth line back to a Roger de Stanworthe, 1200 AD, of Walley, Lancashire, England with a wife's last name only, de Withnell (Wythnell). Not until now, November 2019, did I ever find anything else. Finding the wife's father's name, William de Withnell, I decided he had to be the key because every single record, story, book and document I kept coming across was thick with Withnell importance and history in the Lancashire area. That led me to the Coucher Book of Charters and how land, abbeys etc. were obtained by the notable names of the time. I took that route to see if it would mention anything connecting to Roger de Stanworthe. I located an available, online printing of a book entitled, "The Coucher Book Or Chartulary of Whalley Abby, Vol. III" edited by W. A. Hulton, Esq. Printed for The Cheetham Society, M.D.CCC.XLVIII.

I found the above book by going to the following website and choosing Vol III; The Coucher Book of Whalley – Grimshaw

Origins and History. It is in Latin except for the Contents in the beginning of the book and a few short, explanation excerpts in English throughout the book. Not being able to read or understand Latin I tried using an online translation site for key words I was seeing. I got the gist of some words and found the following:

Read middle of page 831, a succession of pedigree names. Look for line "The second daughter married Roger de Stanword, living temp. John (No.1), who had a son, Adam de Stanword, (No.3), who had a son, Richard de Stanword (No.4), lived circa 1240"

These are the names I have on my personal pedigree chart except the last name is spelled de Stanworthe! See 'living temp.' I don't know what it's abbreviated for but could it be Templar?

By beginning on page 830 under the first paragraph about the land area known as Stanworth I can only figure out part of what is written with my Spanish background. But it is clear when you see the names it is my family's Roger then called Rogeri de Stanword and on page 853 (bottom) Rogerus de Stanword. When you come across the word "villam" it means country house, farmstead. Look through pages 830-876.

(Editor: It has not been possible to publish copies of these pages, but they can be e-mailed to interested members, especially those who can read Latin).

The dates go way back. Stanworth was originally Stanword. To drive the information home to when it headed in the direction of Stanworth for the proof is on page 837, XI.Stanworth (Yes, STANWORTH) you finally see my surname. No wonder no one could go further. We now must look for Stanword to search the Stanworth line going further back. Equally important is finding which country the Stanword line immigrated from prior to going to Britannia. Given more time I have hopes that there may be just one word in the Latin

translation of the Coucher Book mentioning where they were before being given land in Britannia.

I consider it the most significant breakthrough in a lifetime and I am sure there are no genealogists alive who know this connection of our name. No one at any historical society or anyone I have come across in the research world of genealogy has been able to tell me this direction our last name went ... NO ONE! Very exciting.

IS HISTORY TUCKED INTO YOUR FAMILY TREE?

My cousin Eleanor Morton (Nell) Johnson died on 14 May 2001 (aged 85). My brother, who was sorting out her affairs, on the way to the Lake District, brought me three boxes. "You've got the weekend to look at these and then I have to take them down south again and give them to the Bagleys". I dropped everything and frantically wrote and copied as many details as possible and found it riveting. I knew Nell's father had inherited a top job at his family run business because of the loss of the oldest brother in the 2nd World War and that she was an only child and that she never married but had no idea what the business was. (Amongst her many attributes Nell was made a "Freeman of the Worshipful Company of Tinplate Workers alias Wire Workers").

In a letter dated 31st May 1946 to Michael A. Johnson, Nell's father Arthur Lawrence Johnson (b. 13.5.1887) tells of how he is giving "a silver Table Centre and Bon Bon dishes (presented to my grandfather William Johnson on 28th January 1859) to the Worshipful Company of Tinplate Workers alias Wire Workers, to commemorate my own Mastership in 1941/42 & 43". A list of company names (1773 to 1895), and a synopsis of what the company did (signed by George Foulkes, Ironmaster & Wiremaster, Head of Dept.) takes us to the last

entry on the list:- 10th July 1895 – "Visit by The Rt. Hon. A. J. Balfour & Miss Balfour".

Papers, family photo albums, letters and loose photos included Log Books for a sea-going steam yacht, S.Y. "Cara Mara" (sorry, never thought to write down the dimensions but I copied a photo of it) - used for yachting trips (1897 - 1904), up the Western Isles, Shetland, cruises to Norway, Sweden, the Scilly Isles, the Great Orme, Menai Straits, Calais, Ostend - ending with the Baltic coast (1904) - where they visited a firm in Stockholm that made machine tools - (and from where the mother travelled back to England by train because she had a bad foot!) On that cruise they also visited two companies in Copenhagen. They took relatives and friends to Reviews and Regattas - Oban, round the Fleet at Cowes, (1902) - Calais (1903), Coronation Review, Fleet Reviews etc. The second son, Alan D. Johnson (who lived at Christ Church Vicarage, Ashtonu-Lyne) took Sunday services on board as well as in churches up the coast). On one Review trip they had to have two dinner servings because of so many on board - each cruise listed all the names of those who came on board.

It was Arthur Lawrence Johnson, third son, who married one of my grandmother's sisters, Eleanor Belk, on 10th March 1915 at St. Barnabas Church, Middlesboro. Arthur was one of four Johnson boys (no mention is made of who the 4th son was but it says there were 4 sons and 3 daughters – twin girls were the first-born). He also had 3 sisters, the youngest of whom, Lorna A. Johnson, married 2nd Lt. Charles H. F. Bagley on 10th December 1915 - hence the present-day remaining relatives. Arthur's father, William Henry Johnson, of "Messrs. Richard Johnson, Clapham & Morris" (staff and workers - just under 400), and his wife Agnes Morton, from 1883 brought up their family at Woodleigh, Dunham Massey, Altrincham. The Firm made copper wiring, nuts and bolts – described as Pin and Wire Drawers & Smallware Manufacturers - based at Moston - which I am told is now Trafford Park. Arthur Lawrence Johnson (b. 18.5.1887) started work at the Firm on Saturday 8th January 1910 and by Monday 10th January his diary records that he is

"v. sick of my job." Peter Denny tells him he is "a cut above all the other apprentices there ..." and "expects I find it a change from Cambridge". By the end of the week – Friday 14th March 1910, he writes "... got shift after made 1487 nuts, 1291¾" and 1196¾ nuts and am now at a surface table ... work here very interesting as we have all the drawings and set out the work for all the shop ... this is something like a good job ... have begun to coach A.... will teach him something I hope ... thank goodness tomorrow is Sat ... wonder what my renumeration is ... FINE!!" His father died in February 1914. His elder brother William Morton Johnson then became head of the firm. It was to be short-lived. Captain William Morton Johnson, 16th Manchester Regiment (b. 2 September 1881) was killed in France in action at dawn on 2nd July 1916. Arthur Lawrence stepped into his place.

The business all began in 1773 with James Howard at 72 Market Sted Lane. He was a Pinmaker, wire worker and wire weaver. He progressed to be at School Mills, 22 Long Millgate (House in same street) and then became James Howard & Son & Co.- and so it goes on - till 1813 - Howard and Russell, 1818 Johnson & Sharrocks (Pin & Flour Machine Manufacturers), then it was Wire Mill in Edge Street, Shudehill (this Mill fell in and nearly killed some of the hands). In 1838 - Richard Johnson & Bros., the 1860s - Richard & William Johnson (but William died in 1960 aged 49); in 1864 it was Richard Johnson & Nephew (John Thewlis Johnson, son of Thomas Johnson, Cotton Spinner of Bolton, & Manchester, & grandson of afore-mentioned John Johnson). In 1881 Richard Johnson & Nephew - John Thewlis Johnson & James Clarkson Johnson, brothers are listed. (James Clarkson Johnson died in 1890 – also at age 49). From 1890 to 1896 it was all these Johnson's (sons, brothers, nephews) with the last entry on my sheets – for 1896 – Johnson & Nephew - Herbert Alfred Johnson & Ernest Johnson. somehow then became Messrs. Johnson, Clapham & Morris.

That is the background of the Firm and its business – here in two parts is what interests me:-

= FIRST- Re: the Firm - (I have picked out only what seem important historical facts):-

- = in 1850 they "were drawing wire for the first submarine cable Dover to Calais";
- = in 1853/4 they "commenced manufacture of iron rolled Merchant Iron in lengths";
- = in 1854 "wire was drawn for the Niagara Railway Suspension Bridge" "it was packed loose in casks, each cask holding about a ton, & sent to Messrs. Roebling's of Trenton, New Jersey, U.S.A.";
- = in 1857 they "commenced to draw wire for the first Atlantic Cable night & day for months, 16-hour shifts";
- = 5th August 1857 "expedition sailed with the cable from Valentia: cable was less than ¾" in diameter & weighed less than a ton per mile. It was so flexible as to allow coiling in extremely small curves without injury"; [The first half of the Cable was laid in 1857 (first laid in 1857 (first Atlantic Cable) and the second half, in 1858, but not successful so second attempt made in 1865/6]
- = Mar, Apr, 1858 "large order for No.5 galvanised Puddle Wire for India Office";
- = in 1859 "the Red Sea Cable order";
- = in 1861 "drawing No.9 for Tillotsons, New York (all work stopped suddenly due to the American Civil War)"
- = 16th September 1871 "+ engine-powered (previously wound by hand)";
- = in 1876 "two Americans came over, from Washburn & Meons (Worcester, Mass) to teach those at Ambergate to draw wire after the American fashion, viz. through cast dies (it had been tried in Yorkshire, & Birmingham, & also themselves but not succeeded). (in two years they were able to execute orders on their own account.)"
- = in 1877 "Patent wire machine for Barb Wire fencing";
- = in 1878 "Ambergate works closed depression of trade (41 drawers plus many other hands); and then another strike";
- = in 1879 "some were recruited to go to the U.S.A. the first reduction of wire drawers in Lancashire; now drawing No.6 b.w. 9 Puddle Wire for the Telegraph Construction & Maintenance

- Co. (Our firm held the Patent in this country). (On expiration of the Patent, & others making it our work fell off.)"
- = "after Mr. Bedson's visits to America he introduced anew coating for wire salt (boiled). They found a substitute: gum, flour & lime, & eventually as gum was expensive, just flour & lime which is still used today."
- = in 1882 "manufacture of Charcoal Iron stopped";
- = in 1888 "new Annealing House erected on old one plus Mill":
- = in 1890, 4th March "(Mr. Clarkson Johnson died)";
- = 1893 Colliers' strike terminated a lot of work; during coal strike we bought No.6 German rods exclusively soft & ductile amazed at the drawing capacity of the wire without annealing; the German rods created a revolution;

These were some of the notations on the list – Signed by: George Foulkes, Ironmaster & Wiremaster (Head of Department – in 1895)

- **= SECOND Re: the Artist** (George French Angas eldest son of George Fife Angas, British merchant-settler who is remembered as the "father & founder of South Australia);
- = Go back to 1864 the Richard and William Johnson it is this William Johnson (Arthur Lawrence's grandfather) who married Emma Angas, youngest daughter of George Fife Angas of Newcastle & South Australia. I don't know how many children they had but Emma had a brother George French Angas, a celebrated pioneer artist of the Aboriginals of Australia and New Zealand.
- = As a boy, George French Angas, impressed his elders with his great interest in natural history, and his ability to draw the subjects which interested him;
- = Still in his teens he travelled in the Mediterranean and published his first work "A Ramble in Malta and Sicily" illustrated with his own sketches;
- He first went to South Australia in 1843 at the age of 20 travelled extensively – and then spent three months in New Zealand, sketching and painting the Maoris;
- = in 1847 he issued "South Australian Illustrations" and wrote about "preserving true & lifelike records of the men and

scenes now so quickly passing away" and how he has "devoted myself wholly to this work, visiting the remote parts of the colony and acquainting myself with the manners and habits of the native tribes".

- = His sketches were made at Port Lincoln, Encounter Bay, lakes Alexandrina and Albert, Mount Gambier, Mount Schank, Rapid Bay, and Noarlunga.
- = in New Zealand he faithfully portrayed " ... habits, costumes, and works of art, though so rapidly disappearing before the progress of Christianity and Civilisation ... and have succeeded in obtaining portraits of the most important Chiefs, with their families, and have made drawings on the spot of all objects of interest connected with history."
- = in 1847 he returned to England, held an Exhibition of his work, and married (no name) and returned to South Australia; = When he arrived the Gold Fever was at its height and he made sketches of the Ophir Goldfields and the Barossa Valley; = in 1853 he settled in Sydney and became Secretary to the Australian Museum;
- = in 1861 he returned to England. In later years he became an authority on sea-shells – corresponding and collecting widely, and publishing many articles on them;
- = Sociologists, ethnologists, and anthropologists now consult his paintings, lithographs and sketches for detail of Australian and Maori artefacts, face and body markings, customs, weapons, ceremonial dress, and trappings. (Scientists have checked – and find he is completely accurate in every detail.)
- = 150 of his paintings were handed over on behalf of his father's Will Trust, to the Museum, by Mr. James Angas Johnson, whose mother was a sister of the artist, in March 1968 (so said: Marjorie M. Johnson, in a hand-written note on the 2-page newspaper cutting from the South Australian Sunday "Mail" of 22nd March 1968 her address 8 Fitzroy Terrace, Prospect, South Australia).

There was so much of interest in those three boxes about the Johnson family. I confess to say that I have not researched any of it. The tragedy of those lost in war – and perhaps thoughts of what might have been if they had not been lost –

sometimes means celebratory parts of one's family tree – go un-discussed and un-rewarded. I just find it fascinating that it was all lying in Nell's house at Stewkely, in her busy world of horses, dogs, and country life – unearthed and un-discussed – and yet to me so much of it is part of our social history – and – important – and – needs to be remembered.

JIM TOPPING 1930-2020

We are saddened to inform members of the passing of Jim Topping. Jim was a stalwart of the Society, a Vice President, former Society Treasurer, and one of the original Heraldry branch members.

Jim passed away at the beginning of December at the age of 90 years, but sadly had been in a home for 10 years. He died of the implications of vascular dementia. Yet another victim of a small family funeral because of the Covid 19 pandemic.

Many long-standing Society members remember Jim with fondness:

Tony Foster – When I joined the committee he was the treasurer and ensured that the pennies were carefully spent, so much so, that he would try all the scales in the post office to ensure that he found the best one to use!

Steve Benson – I knew Jim for about 2 or 3 years when he regularly attended Heraldry meetings in a wheelchair, accompanied by his good friend and carer Mariam.

Olive Thexton – When I was a newish member, I remember well that I had to go to Jim's house. There were journals all over the place, being put into envelopes ready to be taken to the post. Our branch had to move out of the Hall and hold meetings in the Church on the Tuesday before the usual Wednesday meeting day. Once I had not put the correct information into our branch news and I typed out a note, cut the page into little slips and we had to put one into every journal. I thought that this was a huge job to complete, good job it was only a handful of times per year.

I would like to send thoughts and best wishes to the family. We always say that we are all part of one big family due to the family history research that unites us.

Margaret Purcell – I remember Jim from years ago when I first joined the Society, and used to go to the Preston meetings – also attended by some of the Heraldry people. This was before Fylde branch started.

Hazel Johnson – All those many years ago when I first joined the Society I attended the Preston meetings. Not only was Jim the Society Treasurer, but also Treasurer for Preston branch. I got involved with the journal packers when Mariam's house was used, before we acquired premises in Oswaldtwistle, where we had more space, but we had to listen to Jim and Derrick Walkden counting the correct number of journals to go into each box prior to going to the Post Office. If they didn't agree on the number in a box, it was emptied and they would start again, with all the different postage charges for different

countries. Next, they would start working out the cost for each box, and yet again if they didn't agree they would start all over again. They would never use calculators!

Regularly at Executive meetings we would have to remind Jim to either switch his hearing aid on or turn the volume up so he knew where we were up to. At one AGM held in UCLAN, Jim was sat behind Mariam, Mavis and Me and during what he must have thought was a boring talk, we had to nudge him to stop him snoring!

Always a genuine, helpful, lovely man. So much family history and heraldry information lost.


HOGARTH'S PROGRESS

Always aspiring, as a long-term researcher myself, to achieve a permanent record of my family's history, I was delighted to receive the generous gift of his autobiography from John Hogarth, a member of this society, 3495, entitled 'Hogarth's Progress.' Written with skill, dedication and humour, combining a natural talent for portraying the history of his life and family, with many personal photographs, he has achieved the aim of just about every family historian I know.

He states "In the world as we know it, and with our finite minds, the only certainties are life, death, and history, and history is a record of life. Whilst there is some tangible evidence such as buildings and documents, only a snapshot recorded. The rest exists in memory which disappears on death. The story of families goes some way towards filling the gap which is the object of my records and writings."

How better to describe our existence, most of us researchers



would agree, that usually when it is too late, we resort to wishing we had tackled our departed intimate relations for information, to acquire what we need minimally from public records, many of the family events have died with them. There are many reasons for writing your autobiography, a personal record of one's life events, family involvement, regrets and experiences, and ultimately recollections of history. The interpretation of other members of the family is also very useful for future reviewers as is the delving into the historic family trees of yesteryear.

There are several ways to self-publish, much advice is available on the internet, Amazon have a guide to publishing in a Kindle or Paperback Book format as well as Lulu, Creatspace, Grosvenor House etc., etc. Starting from fresh with a MS Word programme will assist greatly, adding photographs, statistics, family trees and indexing are all summarised for beginners, software packages and graphics can be combined as can indexing of names places and historic events etc., all ways of maximising the availability of content.

Biographies and autobiographies are very interesting to many people, doesn't have to be a celebrity or even a so called 'minor celeb,' there is a remarkable attraction to any individuals life and times as I have found out enjoying my hobby as book reviewer for Cumbria and Lancashire family history societies and others, everybody has a tale to tell! Have a go, its great fun unravelling history!

Much as the book is an interesting read, it is unfortunately a private publication printed in the USA, but it does have an ISBN number, 9 781984 092571.

There is a website htpps://www.justbooks.co.uk/isbn_search where a simple search can, in fact, find the book and where to buy it. This is a valuable resource I have just discovered.

Joint Cumbria/Lancashire/Cheshire/London & South Branch Report

After our successful virtual meeting in August we arranged for the next meeting on 31 October to also be held online. Gill Blanchard talked about 'The 1910-1915 Farm Survey and the National Farm Survey 1941-1943'. Gill considers these surveys to be a valuable yet underused resource. They are especially useful for looking into local history and one-place studies but people do not always realise that they can be a good source for family history. You cannot do family history without looking further into your ancestors' lives and these surveys give a fantastic glimpse into people's rural lives. The Inland Revenue Valuation Survey, also known as the Lloyd George Domesday Survey, was started in 1910 and finished in 1920. Its purpose was to raise revenue for the new Pensions Act and National Insurance Act. It was a review of land and property including private homes. Three documents were completed: The

Valuation Register, including details of ownership and rateable values; two copies of coded and annotated Ordnance Survey Maps; and the Field Book. Surviving copies of the Map and the Register are held at County Archive Offices. Generally, the map was a revised copy of the 1901 Ordnance Survey map. The assessment number for each property is essential to find the paperwork. This was usually handwritten on the map in bold, coloured ink. The second copy of the Map, if it has survived, and the Field Books are held at The National Archives (TNA). The Field Book can give you a glimpse not just into the life of an ancestor but also the inhabitants of a village or place where they lived. It provides detailed information which may include the last purchase date and a description of the buildings. The 1943 National Farm Survey is even less well used for research than the 1910 survey. It was compiled from 4 June 1941 by the farmers of agricultural holdings, including piggeries, fruit farms and market gardens, greater than five acres and it took more than two years to complete the survey. Although there are no personal names there could be interesting information about the area. For example, there may be reference to the Women's Land Army. The numbers of male and female workers were recorded, and it indicated if they were related to the farmer. The National Farm Survey is held at the TNA but you should also look at newspapers for reports on the survey. They are filed by parish name. Each holding has a unique reference including letters for the county and parish. They were graded: A = well managed, B = fairly well managed, C = badlymanaged. If they were badly run the farmer could be replaced, even if he was the owner.

We do not yet have our next meeting arranged but I expect that again it will be held online, using Zoom. Is there a talk or a speaker which you would like to hear which you think would be of interest to the North West Group of Family History Societies? Would you like to give a presentation yourself? We also need people to join the committee, bringing new ideas and to help in organising the talks. Please contact me at the e-mail address below if you have suggestions for future talks or if you would be willing to help with organisation. I am looking forward

to when we can meet again in person but until then we will continue to hold our meetings on a virtual platform. An e-mail will be sent out when we have details of future online talks, and we will post updates on the Society's website and in our Facebook Group. I hope we will be able to meet again sometime during 2021. When we can, talks will take place at St Stephen's Church Hall, 48 Emperor's Gate, Kensington, SW7 4HJ. Bus routes 49 and 74 run along the A4 and there is street parking which is free after 1.30. It is a 5-minute walk from Gloucester Road tube station which is on the Circle, District and Piccadilly Lines. When you leave the tube station walk to the A4 (Cromwell Road) and cross over to the opposite side. Turn left and, staying on the A4, walk to Grenville Place, the first turn on the right. Don't take the first left into Emperor's Gate but continue walking past three houses and take the second turning on the left. You will find St Stephen's Hall a few hundred vards on the right, immediately after the 'Centre for Health'.
