Dalkeith Palace Exhibition: Sat 4th - Wed 8th Nov



THE EXHIBITION The Royal Scots Museum held a temporary exhibition at Dalkeith Palace during Remembrance Week 4 - 8 November. It was great to have been a part of this at Dalkeith Palace and thanks should go to Lorna Kinnaird (Chairman), Gordon Stevens (Deputy), Christine Hannan (Secretary), Sheila Petrie (Membership Secretary), May Wilkins and George Nairn (Committee) for their assistance during the event. There were at least 800 people who attended, and six local schools - and the Lothians FHS had plenty of enquiries. It is likely that our membership will grow because of this event. Of course, it helped that our table had Murray Mints and Celebrations which brought a lot of people towards our table - including school children who enjoyed having a chocolate and took the free NRS pencils on

offer. It was great to help those enquiring about family history and we worked well with the Royal Scots Museum, the National Records of Scotland and ScotlandsPeople Centre in uncovering many service records and finding servicemen from other regiments. The exhibition was amazing and we felt humbled to be a part of it. The event was also attended by Debbi McCall, Midlothian Council Provost. The level of information provided by the regiment going back to the Boer War was outstanding. Lots of planning went into it, from front of house staff to Royal Scots Guides, to the Café to the Volunteering Groups and it was a real 'community event' which pulled in people from all over Scotland and England. It was humbling and emotional to listen to stories from the 'Old Royals'. The event will be run again in 2024 and 2025 (may be in different locations), but wherever it is decided to run the event next, the LFHS will be involved again. This event was successful because the groups involved all came together for one main aim - to make sure the reason behind the poppy is never forgotten.

My Family History Journey

It was my father who was instrumental in encouraging me to find out about The Petrie's. Then, my mother thought it would be interesting to follow her family, The Craik's. I have been 'investigating' for so long now, I can't remember when I started. It may be as much as 45+ years!

The first time I went to Register House where the National Records of Scotland are stored, there were no computers. I did have the important basic information (dates) about my parents' births, marriages, and their parents' vital statistics. I had to look at indices and virtually guess which ledger I wanted to look at. I still remember the thrill of finding my mother's great grandfather's death. There were quite a few William MacDonalds who died in late 1890's in Edinburgh! I went through a good many before finding the correct one. The Servitors who brought the ledgers were amazing. Computers certainly make research very much easier but maybe not as challenging. The thrill of finding an ancestor, no matter how distant, is still there!

Most of the early research was done by going to Register House. I still love going there for a whole day's research. The problem now is the time. I am retired and there seems to be less available time now as I am not working! That is one of the benefits of the *Lothians Family History Society*. It means at least I can check on some information I come across. Other members are very helpful and encouraging, often giving advice about another avenue to follow.

I think I first joined the Society about 2010. I first got involved in transcribing Death Records from Midlothian *Old Parish Records*. I would try and read old Scots handwriting and George McLeod would write down what I said. He trusted my translation, mostly! I really enjoyed these sessions. Our efforts are now on CD's. A great achievement. My Tuesdays are really a bit boring now!

Back to Family History. Members are supportive and are always interested in what has been found. Mind you, no matter how encouraging members are, sometimes the records are not there. Some members of my family, on both the Petrie (Dad) and Craik (Mum) side, emigrated to Australia, New Zealand, Canada, USA, Patagonia, Argentina and South Africa. I still am in touch with a second cousin of Mum's in Australia.

There were two pieces of information I was pleased to find out before my parents died. The family had a house in the East Lothian village of Oldhamstocks. The family story was that John Oliver, a builder in Edinburgh and my grandmother's father, bought the manse and the free church in this village and converted them into houses. Two were sold, one kept so that when the family went on holiday to Oldhamstocks, John's wife was too far away from Edinburgh to come back to check what her husband was up to! I found a much more interesting explanation of John's interest in this village. His parents, William Oliver, and Elizabeth Turnbull, were married in Oldhamstocks Church in 1822.

My mother knew that her father's brother, James, Alexander, had moved to Canada. The brothers lost touch. When my niece and her husband went to Vancouver on their honeymoon, I asked them to check the telephone directory for Craik. She came back with a directory page – with Craik. I wrote off to a few 'A' Craik entries . Wonderful to relate, one of them replied and it was Mum's cousin.

Dad's Side

I found out that the Petrie's came from Fife. William Petrie, a handloom linen weaver, married a Janet Buck. This is the line from which our Petrie's stem. Janet died in 1809. William remarried to a Margaret Wilkie. Though there is no record of their marriage or deaths, their children confirm the relationship. I now have 8 ring binders with Petrie family ancestors. Unfortunately, I am unable to find William's parents.

Mum's Side

I was able to follow the Craik's to the Borders where Andrew Craik married a Mary Mather in 1779.

The Craik's were agricultural labourers and again I have not managed to go back any further than the 1770's. However, I have 13 ring binders with Craik Family ancestors!

Researching your family history can be frustrating as it can be rewarding. It is always fascinating. There are sad moments when you reflect on infant mortality, early deaths of husbands and wives as well as finding those who died in war. There is a sense of satisfaction when you eventually crack a problem. Genealogy should carry a health warning. It is a compulsive hobby. When you run out of 'straight family line', going sideways keeps your interest going! However, sometimes accepting that records of our family may not be there is hard to accept but accept it we must. Whatever happens, don't lose heart. Have fun!
