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

SOCIAL MEDIA NUGGETS – REVEALING H.T. CHRISTSEN, 'THE GRAND OLD MAN OF BUNDABERG'

Do you ever feel that searching the Internet, more specifically social media, is akin to looking for a needle in a haystack? I often think it more closely resembles the panning for gold; washing through a lot of irrelevant dross in the hope of finding specks of gold. Watch out for fools' gold in the form of misinformation and distracting cat videos that produce momentary excitement but that soon gives way to disappointment.

My recent experience seems to give weight to my gold analogy.

The successful gold search must start in the right terrain. In my case, it was a Facebook group called 'Bundaberg: Remember When'. My family roots go back to 1877 when my great grandfather **George Dawson** [1838-1928] settled and bought land. Since then, three generations have lived and worked there. There must surely be someone who remembers some of them?

My first question to the group concerned my cousin **George Dawson** [1889-1968]. He ran a successful bicycle and motor cycle business and was prominent in the cycling fraternity. Did anyone recall his business? Disappointment best described the responses. Someone's grandfather knew a mate of a mate who worked for George, and someone else had tyres pumped up in his shop. Fools' gold I'd say.

I moved on to ask about George's wife, **Florence Christsen** [1862-1924]. Florence was the daughter of **Hans Truvl Christsen** [1856-1926] and **Emma Champ** [1862-1924]. H. T. Christsen also had a successful grocery business in Bourbong Street. My mother remembered the shop from her childhood in the 1930s. By the next day, the Facebook page was awash with memories. I'd struck gold.

Several people remembered working at Christsen's or had family who worked there. One remembered groceries being delivered from them. The grocery business was remembered fondly. 'Sliced ham' was recalled as well as cheese being cut from a block with wire, wrapped in grease proof paper then tied with brown string which was snapped by the grocer. Another recollection of the snapping of string, was the grocer's skill and not to be attempted by children, as the contributor had done, 'nearly to sever his fingers'.

The payment system was also remembered by a woman who had worked in a 'cage type' office to which money was sent on a cable device. The range of goods for sale had been very impressive. The list from one contributor went thus: 'ammo, dynamite, tools, tinned food, bulk flour, grains and deli items'. The emporium had bare wooden floors and 'a smell that still pleasantly lingers in the memory'. In subsequent research at the Queensland State Archive, a H.T. Christsen letterhead was found. The emporium's impressive inventory was reflected on the stylishly designed logo.

There was also bulk wine from large barrels in the days when wine drinking was a rarity. The customers for this trade were mostly Germans for the white wine and Italians for the red. The term 'plonk' was used by the contributor who claimed the expression had been used by the returning soldiers from the Western Front who had drunk 'vin blanc' in France. It's a good story.

I was very pleased to have one respondent make a connection between H.T. Christsen's and Bundaberg's famous spirit Bundy Rum. Christsen's operated their own bottling plant in the Bourbong Street premises at the rear of

the grocery and hardware. The spirit was sold at UP and OP strengths. The bottles were recycled Bushels Coffee Chicory bottles. Bundaberg folk sold them to Christsen's for one penny per bottle. They were washed and refilled with the famous spirit. The shape remained the same whereas the capacity has increased to 700 millilitres. H.T. and his son **Frederick** [1890-1962] preferred to employ staff of the Salvation Army faith in the rum bottling department as they were less likely to be tempted to sample the spirit. I felt very lucky to hear these stories and for the group to share them.

All these specks of information were creating a picture of an industrious family. Of their 13 children, three sons seemed to have been heavily involved in the business. It was not just business that concerned the Christsen's because they also took an interest in the financial welfare of customers who had difficulties. One respondent told of his grandmother using the mortgage service provided, whereby the family farm mortgage was transferred to H.T. after the death of the grandfather. High death duty placed a considerable burden on the grandmother. However, she was able to remain on the farm until her death in 1940 at which time the Christsen's took the farm.

After three days, responses ceased. My subsequent posts have yielded no treasure. Further searching on Trove produced H.T.'s obituary which referred to him as 'the grand old man of Bundaberg'.² He was further praised as 'one of the most esteemed and respected men in Bundaberg and was an ardent supporter of all movements to advance the district. His honesty and integrity were unquestioned and these combined with his industry, thrift and ambition were the mainstays of his success'.³ His contributions live on in the collective memory of the city he loved.

CHARLES KEANE, A BLACK SHEEP IN THE FAMILY

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Until they were adults, my mother and her siblings knew little about their Uncle **Charles** who died in 1921. What had he done that his sister's children knew virtually nothing about him?

One day in the late 1940s, my grandfather told my mother and her sister that Uncle Charles had run off and married an older woman, **Lucille Mullaly**, a governess, when he was very young. There was an inference that she had led Charles astray and was certainly beneath him socially. Three children were born. He added that in 1941, my grandmother, Charles' sister, received a letter from Charles' younger daughter **Ruth**. She had seen the death notice for **Ada**, Charles' mother. She asked if she could visit my grandparents.

It was several years after this visit that Mum and her sister were given the scant details of Charles' life and Ruth's visit, and many more years before I heard the bare bones of the story. It was a short and sad tale.

Ruth told my grandparents that she and her siblings spent time in care. Charles poured carbolic acid down the throat of one of the children. They lived in poverty. In 1931, Charles and Lucille's teenage son was hit by a car in Sydney and killed. Their eldest daughter was also dead. No contact was maintained with Ruth after the visit.

I have since discovered more about Charles and his family.

Just after his nineteenth birthday, Charles married Lucille Mullaly at St Mary's Catholic Church, Young. The only witnesses were Lucille's mother **Isabella** and a young priest. Lucille was aged twenty-four and five months pregnant.

Her father had died when she was four, and she and her mother and sister were living on the property of her grandfather, **James Gibb**. *Berthong*, near Young, was a large holding running 34,000 sheep. Isabella's brothers were wool and sheep judges at the Royal Easter Show and the family had city properties in the wealthy eastern suburbs of

Sydney. The Gibb family was socially prominent with numerous newspaper articles detailing their magnificent parties and attendance at other important social events.

Charles' parents **John Joseph Keane** and Ada Gunson came from notable Irish Catholic families in Melbourne Wagga Wagga. Charles' grandfather. William Gunson, was the first editor of the Catholic Advocate newspaper. The families included four nuns and a Knight of the Catholic Church. The Keane family had also owned several Riverina properties but lost them in the 1890s recession. When Charles married, John and Ada were living in Cootamundra where John worked as stock and station agent.

It seemed the young, disgraced couple were sent to live in the anonymity of Sydney. Charles, however, was not going quietly. When Lucille gave birth to their daughter **Colleen** in May 1905, he proudly and loudly proclaimed the fact in not one but two birth notices in the *Sydney Morning Herald*. When Ruth was born in 1908, no birth notice appeared. **Stewart Keane** was born in 1916.

When Stewart was 11 months old, he was taken into care and for the rest of his short life he was fostered by the **Nicolls** family and went by the name Nicolls. A document about his fostering notes in the *Particulars of Parents* section that his father Charles Keane 'deserted'. Above Charles' name is the name **Henry Holmes** and the document then notes that Stewart is illegitimate. Perhaps, he was not Charles' son but the result of a relationship the deserted Lucille had with Henry Holmes. When did Charles desert Lucille?

Charles died in the Rookwood Asylum on 17 June 1921 from tuberculosis. His death certificate stated he was a grocer, that marriage information was unknown, that he had no children and his mother's first name was Ada. These scant details suggest a life cut off, at least in Charles' mind, from family.

How long he was in the Asylum before he died may have contributed to the lack of information about his life.

Nevertheless, the following death notice appeared in the *Sydney Morning Herald:*

'KEANE.—At Sydney, on the 17th Inst., Charles Gunson beloved younger son of Jack and Ada Keane, Cootamundra. Brother of Sydney and May (Mrs. Bromhead), grandson of the late John Keane, Pullitop, Wagga Wagga, and of the late W. H. Gunson first editor of "The Advocate", loved nephew of Peter J. Keane. R I P.'


When Stewart died in 1931 after he was crushed between a motor van and a brick wall, Charles Keane, grocer, was noted on the death certificate as his father.

Perhaps Charles was in contact with his parents and siblings before he died. However, their lack of contact or knowledge about his children after his death seems terrible to me now. They were my mother's cousins and my grandmother's nieces and nephew.

Ruth married a pottery agent and had a family. She lived in Strathfield and died in Colleen was an artists' model in Sydney. There are several mentions of her in newspapers during the 1920s and 1930s. In 1929, the Daily Telegraph reported that a new movie was about to start production in which Colleen Keane, well known in city art circles, was to feature prominently. In 1938, auburn haired artists' model Colleen appeared several times to give evidence before the Industrial Commission in hearings to raise models' wages. Other articles note that Colleen resided with Joan Brettan, a model for many of Norman Lindsay's works. Colleen died in 1941. Like her father, she was 35 years old and died of tuberculosis. would like to know more about her and her life in Sydney's artistic circles.

It occurs to me now that Charles may have suffered from a mental illness that has affected many members of my mother's family. Now known as bipolar disease, it was not understood or well treated in Charles' lifetime. I have no doubt that Charles' parents and siblings loved him, but the combination of Catholicism, Victorian values, possible mental illness, and antipathy to the Protestant woman that took him from them led to the long years of silence about him and disinterest in his children.

I have only recently discovered that my grandmother's first child died shortly after his birth in 1911. She named him Charles.

THE VOYAGE FROM LEITH, SCOTLAND TO ADELAIDE, SOUTH AUSTRALIA

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This piece of writing describes the voyage out from Scotland to Adelaide in 1839 by my g-g grandparents **James** and **Elizabeth Adamson** and their seven children. It is in the form of a letter to Elizabeth's parents. (Adelaide was founded in 1836).

Ship Letter Mr and Mrs David Beveridge Guild-Hall St Dunfermline Scotland

Dear Mother and Father

At last I can write to you now we have safely arrived in Adelaide on the *Recovery*. It's been so long — we were 20 weeks on the deep. I can tell you that Mr Adamson and the children are all well and have thrived on the voyage — except for the boredom — it seemed almost like a prison in the last few weeks.

Our voyage from Leith to London only took four days. You may recall we had been strongly recommended to buy a chest of drawers in two halves, for ease of transportation. We found the ideal item at a Cabin Fitter, in Bishopsgate St., London. We finally left London on 21 May after waiting there nearly three weeks for other passengers to arrive at the emigrants' depot. We then spent two days at Plymouth taking on the final passengers and our water and last vegetables. About 250 passengers in all.

The only other stop we made was at St Jago in the Cape Verde Islands where we spent a most interesting three days. We marvelled at the banana and orange groves, we had never seen either of these fruits growing before. And the tropical vegetation, growing so luxuriantly, with brilliant-coloured flowers amid the lush greenery. We were very glad to take on a new supply of fruit and vegetables for the voyage.

In the Southern Atlantic, where I can only describe the location as about 1000 miles from St Paul, a fire broke out on the ship. We all feared greatly for our safety, being hundreds of miles from land and not a sail in sight. There were about 10 barrels of

gunpowder in the hold near where the fire occurred. You can imagine everyone seized with terror and dreading the worst. Your children look to you for aid but you can afford them none. However the resourceful crew extinguished the flames and we were able to proceed without a lot of damage to the ship.

No particular diseases occurred on the ship, except many children had the Whooping Cough. In all there were eight births in the ship & five young children died. We had plenty of Provisions and for some time had Lime Juice and sugar served out to us to prevent the Scurvey.

When we finally reached Adelaide, the ship initially made anchor at Holdfast Bay, where the pilot came aboard; he and his crew were quite formal, they wore white jackets, vests and trowsers [sic], and large cabbage-tree hats. Some of the cabin passengers went ashore. However the ship continued on to Port Adelaide, and we the emigrants were landed at what is called the 'Creek Settlement', a rather dismal and muddy shore with lots of mosquitoes.

On our arrival, we were surprised to find Adelaide is still a forest of trees, under which the blacks still erect their mi-mis in which they sleep at night, while the streets are represented by avenues cut through the forest of gum-trees. There is still only a small number of houses in the settlement, and so, like most of our fellow-passengers, we have pitched our tent under a spreading eucalyptus tree at a spot near the River Torrens. Young **James** has already painted a picture of our little home under canvas, one day perhaps you will see it. There is plenty of work for James and the older boys, as carpenters and wheelwrights are in great demand. And the Wages are good, so we are already setting some money bye [sic].

James has secured us a good-sized block of land in Hanson Street and he and the boys hope to start building a pise house in a few weeks, there is plenty of space for a large workshop in the future.

As the Ships mail closes in an hour, I must now conclude which I do by recommending you both to the care and protection of that Divine Being who neither Slumbers nor Sleeps.

Remember me to my brothers most affectionately. Make my kind compliments

also to all old friends, my old acquaintances and anyone else who may take the trouble to enquire for us.

Believe me my very dear Father and Mother,

Your affectionate and loving daughter,

Elizabeth Adamson.

Mr Adamson and the children send their sincerest compliments too.

Laurie Bulley, father of QFHS member Lesley Stratford, died on 4 April 2024, aged 97 years. It was through his daughter that Laurie began his work for us. Laurie was not a member of the Society but was a valued member of the indexing team. Laurie started indexing for us in 2008 and since that time has indexed more than 360,000 records covering cemetery records, electoral rolls, school admissions, Colonial Forces General Orders, and passenger lists. He no sooner finished one batch of work than he asked for the next!

Laurie has done much more for the Society than many of our members. He was an excellent indexer, reliable, accurate and careful. He will be known to very few at the Society but nonetheless his participation in an important aspect of our work has been considerable. It is easy to list the number of records he has indexed, but what does it actually mean? Does anyone who is not an indexer have any idea of the effort required? He will have spent thousands of hours producing indexes for QFHS.

Laurie appeared in many of the records indexed by us. Although he probably didn't index these particular indexes, he appears in indexes for Emerald State School, Townsville State High School, and the Qld Commonwealth Electoral Rolls, just to name a few.

With Lesley's encouragement Laurie wrote his life story with the title "Making the Most of It". His father had died before Laurie was three years old. He and his siblings were brought up by his mother and grandmother during the depression years. They didn't have a lot but he said he didn't feel that he had to do without: they learned to "make do". acknowledged that without radio, television and today's social media they were less aware of what other people had. He felt his upbringing did develop his sense of duty and work ethic, which stayed with him. Making a contribution through his indexing was important to his daily routine in his latter years, and it was only in August last year that Laurie was unable to continue indexing. His contribution to QFHS will be sadly missed.

We pass on our condolences to his family.

QFHS INC. FAMILY HISTORY BOOK AWARD PRESENTATION 2024

Three people entered their family history works for our Award this year, and our judges had the challenging task of deciding between three quite different stories. As usual, all entrants achieved their own goals and produced valuable contributions to broaden our knowledge and understanding of the history of families and places in Queensland. Books are not usually written with the purpose of entering a competition, so while our specific criteria were sometimes not met, the people for whom these works were produced – the authors' families communities – will doubtless be very satisfied with them. Congratulations on your great work.

I would like to encourage anyone who is planning to compile a family history to check out the many resources available to assist them before they begin the task. The criteria for this Award include useful information about the technical elements required for a good book; our Writing Group can offer information about specific aspects, and there have been several journal articles over the years which can also help. The lending library contains copies of all the entries since the inception of the Award just over thirty years ago, and I would encourage members to explore this collection. You will find not only ideas about how to approach the telling of your own story, but also references to a huge number of geographical locations which just might aid your research.

This year's entries were:

Eduard Gottlieb Julius Neuendorf -Family And Ancestors by Judge Gregory J Koppenol. As the title suggests, this book, even though it does include extensive family detail, is primarily a biography. It follows the direct family line of Eduard Gottlieb Julius Neuendorf, known as Julius, both before and after his emigration to Australia, and so gives a narrow view of the family. There is more emphasis on the family origins in Germany, by impressive professional supported research, than on their Queensland story. Only one diagrammatic family tree is

included, and this focusses on Julius' forebears. There are numerous and varied illustrations which are well placed. This book does not meet the criteria established for this Award, lacking the key structural features — a title page or reverse, an index, bibliography, reference list or ISBN.

Peacehaven Botanic Park, Legacy of a **Pioneering Family** by Barbara McKenzie. This book is a comprehensive history of the Peacehaven Botanic Park, just north of Toowoomba, and its benefactor Stan Kuhl. The Kuhl family story is a relatively small part of the book which focusses on the park, its conception, creation, development and purpose; a chart showing the first generations of the family in Queensland would have been a helpful addition to support the family history element. This book is very well written and attractively presented – the design, paper quality and illustrations. The illustrations are well-placed and relevant; the index is comprehensive. It is an authoritative and very readable local history, and an excellent example of an important extension to family history. Read this book and you will want to visit the park next time you are in the Toowoomba area. Our judges were very impressed with this book and its relevance to the history of Highfields, and have deemed it Highly Commended as Local History.

What's In A Name, And Where Did We Come From? The Louis family from 1778 by Sylvia Bannah. The questions posed in this rather clunky title are clearly answered. Based on wide-ranging and in-depth research in Germany and Queensland, the work covers seven generations of the Louis family, exploring changes in surname spelling over time and place. The story is well placed historically, with good local content and preemigration history. The inclusion of some detail of the author's personal research journey, and simple family tree charts, appropriately placed, help guide the reader through the complexity produced by multiple marriages and early deaths. **Publication** conventions and content requirements are

generally satisfied, although the bibliography only lists print sources and not all illustrations are credited. This book is the *2024 Winner* of the Queensland Family History Society Book Award.

I would like to thank our judges most sincerely. As ever, their deliberations were thoughtful and detailed. It is always a pleasure to meet with them and to hear their discussions.

1874 – ON THE HERSCHEL IN SEARCH OF A NEW LIFE

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Gute Reise: Bon voyage! Happy travels! Liebe Mutti

I miss you desperately. I was about to head back home when I remembered what you said about the coming political unrest and how **Dorothea** was depending on my arrival, and I was strong again. Remember how heavily it was raining when I left? Well, it kept raining and was freezing cold all the way to Hamburg. By the time we arrived at the wharf, I was shivering, and my teeth were chattering so loudly I could almost make music. It was such a relief to go aboard straight away and change into warm, dry clothing. And I was thankful for the food you gave me, too. We weren't given anything last night nor for breakfast this morning. almost didn't want to eat the apple pie because it reminded me of home and you.

The Captain, Master Friedrichs, came on board and we set out as planned on the morning tide on April 1 but, as soon as we left the River Elbe, strong winds stopped us going any further and we had to stay near Cuxhaven for three days. Did you know it's more than 14000 nautical miles to Australia? That's astonishing, isn't it? I'll be too far away from you. I've made friends with Amalie, a girl from Hamburg. She's going to live in Brisbane with her brother and work in his grocery shop. She's 18, so a bit older than me, but we both love adventure and music, and Amalie makes me laugh. When she found out it was my birthday on the

second day, she organised for the other women to sing 'Zum Geburtstag viel Glück'. It was kind of her, but I was embarrassed. I miss you more every day, but I'm trying to be positive.

The Herschel has three masts and two decks. It's 30 feet x 165 feet x 19 feet - whatever that means. To me it means small. It used to be a steam ship called the Edith Byrne, but the steam engines were removed, and I think that's where they've put us. It certainly smells bad, not like the wonderful leather polish smell of papa's workshop. Women without families have been separated from other passengers here at the back of the ship, so I should be safe. Anyway, Nicolaus showed me what to do if anyone tries anything. Our bunks are built three up into the sides of the ship with benches and tables in between where we can sit to eat, chat or write as I am now. I see why we weren't allowed to bring more than we could carry. All my belongings are under the bottom bunk. The light here isn't good at all.

Once we set off again on April 4, we sailed non-stop for about a week before another gale forced us to anchor. When we got going again, we came upon an English brig in trouble. A brig is a merchant ship which has two masts, both square rigged. Aren't you impressed by my growing sea knowledge? I want to know everything. That's no surprise to you, of course. The *Herschel* waited near the other vessel till we could launch a lifeboat

to rescue the crew - nine men. We dropped the English sailors in Madeira.

Passengers get up at 7 am. That's when we do our chores and washing. Tea is early – 6 pm. I suppose that's so they can look after the cabin passengers. We hear music coming from higher in the ship and sometimes we make our own music and dance down here. Lights out is at 8 pm, but you know me – I'm ready for bed by then anyway. I tuck in the blanket you gave me tightly all round with my head under, too. There are rats down here and one bit Amalie on her toe. We cleaned it as well as we could, but it was disgusting to think about.

The *Herschel* crossed the Equator yesterday, May 12. So now we're in the southern hemisphere and I'm on the other side of the world! We all miss home meals and you'd be upset to see what they give us. We get soup every day and I think they make it with the scraps from the meals of the cabin passengers. But it's food, so I'll be thankful. Sometimes we get potatoes, and we boil them down here and add them to the soup. Today we got a bit of stringy beef. It was tough as anything, even after we simmered it for ages, but at least it was a change from the usual soup and added some flavour. We get bread,

black bread, and you should see how quickly I eat it softened in the soup.

Early in June we came level with the Cape of Good Hope. Soon after that, we headed straight to the east towards Australia, driven by really strong winds called the Roaring Forties. Our first sighting was Cape Leeuwin at the southern tip of Western Australia, but it was July before we reached the east coast at Cape Otway. Are you marking all these places on the map in papa's workshop? From there we headed north and got to Point Lookout on July 11. We were so close and then the weather turned dreadful, and it took another three days to reach Cape Moreton. We were frustrated to be slowed down so close to the end of the journey. But the pilot came on board that same day and guided the Herschel into Moreton Bay. Next morning we discovered we were anchored off the Pilot Station.

I'm all packed and we've been told to report on deck in half an hour ready to disembark, so I'll finish this later. I've arrived in Brisbane! I'm excited but I'm nervous, too. I hope **Detlef** is here to meet me as Dorothea said he would.

QUEENSLAND FAMILY HISTORY SOCIETY INC. PRESIDENT'S REPORT FOR THE YEAR 14 JUNE 2023 TO 19 JUNE 2024

Perhaps the most significant event for Queensland Family History Society over the last 12 months was submitting a successful competitive tender for the Brisbane City Council community facility at 46 Delaware St, Chermside.

A small team of the Management Committee worked diligently to gather the evidence and craft our responses to BCC's selection criteria. In all, 50 supporting documents were developed – from detailed descriptions of the value we provide to the family history community, letters of support from new and longstanding members, the number of hours of education or peer learning we delivered, the opportunities for connection and shared endeavour, and the fact that we have 80 regular volunteers plus an additional 20-30 who will volunteer for specific events.

We maintained (with supporting articles and studies) that, as an organisation that encourages and supports volunteers, QFHS makes a significant contribution to the mental health of individuals.

- Studies have shown that volunteering contributes significantly to the health and wellbeing of the individual.
- Volunteering opens the door to life satisfaction.
- Helping others triggers the reward pathway in the brain and releases 'feelgood' neurotransmitters - individuals who volunteer feel happier and healthier.
- Volunteers feel a sense of belonging and, working with others, develop 'emotional contagion' and infect others with positivity.
- Volunteering allows us to embrace our passions.

In addition, we argued, providing opportunities for QFHS members to volunteer across a wide range of options contributes significantly to the wider community:

- Volunteers are more likely than nonvolunteers to have attended a community event recently.
- Volunteers are 30% more likely to believe that most people can be trusted - 62% (volunteers) compared to 49% (nonvolunteers).
- Volunteers are significantly more likely to be 'delighted, pleased or mostly satisfied' with their lives.
- Volunteers are more likely than nonvolunteers to provide assistance to others outside their own household.

This very important factor, along with a detailed Maintenance Plan, sound governance and finances, long-term stability, and a demonstrable ability to maintain BCC's community facility to a high standard resulted in QFHS winning the tender and being offered a Lease.

While the Lease will save the Society considerable expenditure on rent (this was \$35,000 p.a. for many years at Gaythorne but increased to double that for the last few months of our tenancy there), BCC requires their tenants to commit considerable resources, in terms of time and/or cost, to maintenance, building insurance and the like.

In addition, the new premises has a smaller footprint than Gaythorne and we had to hire a storage unit at commercial rates for the 'overflow'.

As part of the competitive tender process, we signed a Memorandum of Understanding with Growl Theatre, a community group looking for storage space for their props and costumes. In return for their support of our tender application (BCC is understandably keen that their community facilities meet the needs of as many community groups as possible), QFHS undertook to provide the external shed for Growl Theatre's use. The incoming Management Committee will liaise with BCC to execute an appropriate tenancy

agreement/licence with our new community partner and vacate the shed.

Work has been undertaken by Alex Daw and QFHS Fellow Shauna Hicks OAM, with support from Rosie Gall and Carolyn Grimward, to review and update our Collections Development Policy. Such a policy is important for guiding management of our collection of resources and ensuring volunteer time and Society funds are invested in the items that will add most value to our members and help the Society achieve its goals.

Work has also begun on establishing a number of digitisation projects in the upcoming year — starting with the Queensland Electoral Rolls for 1982 and 1989. This will release space in the commercial storage unit and, more importantly, add significantly to QFHS datasets and expand the benefits of QFHS membership.

There are even more treasures (aka valuable family history resources) to be discovered in other boxes of donated papers, certificates, and personal research currently in storage.

The successful tender application also made it possible to apply to BCC to undertake various works at the facility. First priority was the (re)installation of air conditioning units and we have received approval to do so, subject to a report from a structural engineer and development of a Safety in Design report. Thanks to Chris Gibbs for arranging for quotes from structural engineers and Greg Crawford who is currently working up the Safety in Design report.

As tenants of a BCC facility, these are the sorts of additional conditions our new landlord requires, and they impose extra workload on key personnel.

Approval has also been received for installation of new kitchen cabinetry, and the next priorities for Applications for Works to BCC are exterior signage and new doors for both the entrance and kitchen to provide increased light, improved ventilation and security features. Architectural drawings

have been prepared for a portico over the new front door.

Another major undertaking commenced during the past 12 months is the review of the Society's Constitution. Charlotte Sale has taken on this mammoth task for the Management Committee and has been competently supported by Chris Schuetz. So far, the work has involved consultations with an advisory group of members, detailed discussions with a lawyer specialising in incorporated associations like QFHS, and further consultations with Management Committee. Discussion opportunities with the wider membership are scheduled in coming months.

Some detail of the Constitution Review Committee's work is included in the full Annual Report and the Society can look forward to a new draft Constitution and associated By-Laws being presented at the General Meeting in September.

The last 12 months have seen several significant events for the Society including anniversary celebrations for two of our Special Interest Groups — and the hosting of visiting international speakers from the Ulster Historical Foundation (UHF) in Ireland. The UHF event was important for several reasons including:

- the opportunity for our members to hear highly respected experts in their field.
- the fact that over 100 gathered for the event is a big indicator that family historians are prepared to gather in person and pay for quality speakers.
- that such conference/seminar type events can be profitable for the Society and would provide the diversification of income we would do well to invest time and effort in generating.

The anniversary celebrations for two of our Special Interest Groups were highlights of the past year and both successful and delightful: the happy buzz during the special morning tea preceding the formalities, the contributions of past and present convenors, the poetry, the music and dancing at the Irish

20th, and the launch of a new and significant dataset in the Les Moreland Scrapbook Index at the Central European 40th were all immensely satisfying. Of course, such events don't imagine or organise themselves and cannot be delivered without many more 'hands on deck' on the day. All members who volunteered for various tasks - the organisers, in particular - are to be congratulated.

Of course, the dependable bread and butter work of the Society, so relied upon by our members, has continued throughout the past year:

- the Education, Special Interest and Members Lounge teams have provided opportunities for learning, peer coaching and forming social connections.
- valuable research materials, both print and digital, have been generated, enhanced and maintained.
- the Family History Research Centre is appropriately equipped and has been made comfortable, welcoming, secure and stimulating.
- communications have kept members informed and hopefully inspired to try something new,

and

 management of the Society have encompassed many challenges – these have been handled appropriately and with imagination and an eye to the future.

The Society's strategic plan (no small task to update in 2023) continued to shape and direct our endeavours. For a strategic plan to be effective, it must be central to our work and this we have aimed to do. Each of the strategic priorities:

- Strengthen and build membership
- Attract and support volunteers
- Enhance our digital footprint
- Sustain financial viability
- · Enrich our reputation
- Improve operational capability

has shaped and guided our endeavours and each is the lens through which our activities are reported.

The strategic priority of enriching the Society's reputation is perhaps the most what nebulous concept: exactly 'reputation'? and what activities will enrich it? One thing we can define more easily is the types of activities that will inflict reputational damage: financial troubles, unlawful or unethical acts, incorrect information, and unfriendly dealings. while the Society's reputation may be enhanced and extended by our Community Outreach activities and key members taking QHFS out into the wider world, our reputation is built upon the way we conduct ourselves as an organisation. governance requirements, acting ethically in delicate areas of family history research, ensuring the products we deliver are accurate and of a high standard, continuing to provide a welcoming environment both in person and online so all who interact with QFHS feel it's been worthwhile - these are all the basic building blocks of our reputation. Thank you to all members and volunteers who ensure our reputational foundation is solid.

Finally, we must pay tribute to the outgoing Management Committee. It has been a very busy year and your forbearance and commitment have been greatly appreciated. While we all play a part as our skills, knowledge, personalities and available time allow, all contributions have been valuable, appreciated and of benefit to the Society.

QUEENSLAND FAMILY HISTORY SOCIETY INC. TREASURER'S REPORT FOR THE FINANCIAL YEAR 1 APRIL 2023 TO 31 MARCH 2024

It is with pleasure that I present the QFHS financial reports for the year ending March 2024. It has been a year of consolidation in our first full year at the new Chermside premises but with accompanying growth in the enhancement of our offerings to both existing and new members.

The Society remains in a strong financial position at the end of the 2023–24 financial year. Bank deposits total \$305,594, an increase of \$5,474 (+ 1.8%) from the end of the previous financial year.

The value of QFHS's assets has increased significantly during the past year due primarily to an independent valuation of the Society's Library resources. This expert review assessed the market value of the Print Library as \$596,221, an increase of \$323,724 over the value held previously in the accounts. As a result of this revaluation and premises improvement works undertaken, the total Property, Plant and Equipment asset value (after depreciation) at the end of the financial year is \$696,643, up from \$395,312 at the beginning of the year. With the addition of QFHS's cash and other current assets, the Net Assets of the organisation are \$1,026,341.

In the past financial year, total income for the Society was \$88,538. This is a pleasing result as it is an increase of \$11,175 (+14.4%) over the equivalent income for last year (excluding a one-off Ancestry payment last year associated with a data access agreement). Membership subscriptions at \$57,409 represent the largest component of income (64.8%) and have increased by \$1,788 (3.1%) from last year.

Member education services, in the form of seminars, workshops and events, at a total income of \$10,242 (11.6%), contributed the largest increase (+\$6,286 or 159%). The major contributors to this increase were the Irish Group's 20th anniversary event and the seminar held featuring overseas speakers

from the Ulster Historical Foundation. Acknowledgement is due to all members who organised and assisted with these events, particularly representatives of the Irish Interest Group. The third significant contributor to income is Royalties, at \$14,233 (16.1%), received from commercial organisations for their use of a selection of QFHS datasets. This year's Royalties income was similar to last year (-\$286).

Operating expenses for the financial year were \$67,440. With the addition of the assessed depreciation amount of \$37,657, total expenditure is \$105,097, resulting in a reported loss for the year of -\$16,559.

The significant expense variations for the year, compared to the previous year, include advertising and promotion (+\$2,286), rent (-\$17,681), seminar costs (+\$5,006) and relocation costs (-\$14,298).

In presenting this report, I particularly acknowledge the significant contributions of the Assistant Treasurer, Wendy Angliss, for her ongoing efforts in managing the recording of financial transactions and data within our financial systems and for the support and advice always readily provided. My thanks are also extended to Membership Leanne Secretary. Donovan, management and oversight of membership payments and activities, to Pat Gardner for looking after the Bookshop stock and sales, and to Sarah Barry for managing QFHS's subscriptions with other overseas and local family history Societies. I thank each one for their contributions.

The Society has had a strong year financially and we remain in an excellent financial position to move forward to deliver on growth and enhanced service to members.

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THE GERMAN DESERTER AND THE ENGLISH ORPHAN

Introduction

Before looking into the German ancestry of my great-grandfather **Hermann Schramm** (1851-1912), I visited a second cousin in order to share information on the Schramm family and their descendants.

According to family folklore they had heard, Hermann had abandoned his first wife and children in Germany, travelled to Australia and then jumped ship. Some years later he married our great-grandmother **Agnes Prendergast** (1866-1941) who was believed to have been an English orphan. Hermann's son from his first marriage **Oscar Schramm** was also said to have visited Australia from Germany looking for relatives at some stage.

Hermann Schramm - First Marriage

Hermann Heinrich Christian Schramm was born in Verden, Lower Saxony, Germany on 13 October 1851. He was married to his first wife Sophie Ernestine Johanne Nieschlag on 1 June 1873² in Saint Aegidien's Church in Hanover, Lower Saxony, Germany. She was born on 10 March 1854³ in Wülfel just south of Hanover. They had two children born in Hermann Hanover. August **Schramm** on 11 April 1874 and Anna Sophie Hedwig **Marie Schramm** on 11 July 1875⁵. Unfortunately Johanne died within a month of giving birth to their daughter on 8 August 1875⁶. See family tree in Figure 1.

It is not known what Hermann did immediately after the death of his wife. His children were only one month and 16 months old. Hermann's mother had died 10 years before and his only sister was living about 300 kilometres away in Berlin with a 10 month old baby of her own. No record of any siblings of Johanne have been found.

Hermann Schramm - Immigration

Finding an immigration record for Hermann took quite a while. His NSW naturalization record from 1896 (see Figure 2) provided the name of a ship the *Kehrwieder* and an arrival date of 19 April 1882. A quick search on TROVE proved that the *Kehrwieder* only sailed to Australia once and that was in 1883. The passenger list for the voyage in 1883 was found but it did not include Hermann Schramm. Eventually after a few years a list of crew and passengers for the *Kehrwieder* voyage which arrived 25 September 1883 was found and it included H. Schramm a sail trimmer aged 24 years. His real age was 31 years though.

So the rumour that he had abandoned his first wife in Germany was incorrect. It appears though that he did abandon his children there at some stage between 1875 and 1883.

The other part of the story about him travelling to Australia and jumping ship is partially true. He did leave the ship

Kehrwieder in Sydney in 1883 but the circumstances are unable to be determined. A search of TROVE and the NSW Government Gazette failed to find any evidence that he had jumped ship.

Agnes Prendergast - In England

Agnes' marriage certificate (Figures 5 & 6) provided information on her parent's names (**Michael Prendergast** and **Mary Curran**) and the city she was born in (Liverpool). Armed with that information and that she had been an orphan it was relatively easy using Ancestry to complete the story of her early life.

Agnes was born on 4 April 1866⁸ in Liverpool, Lancashire, England to Irish parents. Her father Michael died when she was only 2 years old on 25 November 1868⁹. That left her mother Mary to bring up four children 16 years of age or younger.

Mary is shown as a widow with her four children in the 1871 census¹⁰ living in Vauxhall, an inner city suburb of Liverpool. Sadly Mary died three years later on 20 December 1874¹¹ leaving four orphaned daughters. At this point the children ranged in age from eight to 22 years with Agnes being the youngest.

From the 1881 census¹² it is known that Agnes was an inmate of the Female Catholic Orphanage (Female Orphan Asylum) located at 47A Falkner Street, Liverpool.


Figure 3 Female Orphan Asylum in Myrtle Street, Liverpool

In the 1891 census¹³ Agnes appears as a patient in the Northern District Hospital in Vauxhall, Liverpool. Her occupation is shown as a Housemaid/Domestic Servant. Agnes' parents and siblings are shown in the family tree in Figure 4.

At some time between 1891 and 1894 Agnes emigrated to Australia. Her migration details are yet to be determined.

Hermann Schramm - Second Marriage

Herman Schramm and Agnes Prendergast were married on 13 October 1898¹⁴ at the Manse (Congregational Mission Church) in Pitt Street, Sydney. On the certificate his age has been lowered from 47 to 39 years and hers from 32 to 27 years. Hermann also showed his marital status as bachelor instead of widower.

Agnes Prendergast (Figure 7) and Hermann Schramm went on to have six children born in Sydney between 1900 and 1910.

Two of the children including my grandfather moved to North Queensland and remained there. The family tree is shown in Figure 8.




Figure 9 Arnott's Biscuits Advertisement -Bridget Nora Schramm and Michael Schramm

Their first born children were a set of twins **Michael** and **Bridget** who were featured in an Arnott's Biscuits advertisement¹⁵ in the

newspapers of the time. (Figure 9)

Oscar Schramm – Australian Visit

As indicated in the introduction, Hermann Schramm's son Oscar (from his first marriage in Germany) was believed to have visited Australia. Since he did not emigrate here and the year is unknown, it has proved very difficult to find any record of his visit. All searches to date have been unsuccessful.




Figure 8 Hermann Schramm's Second Wife & Children



MONMOUTH REBELLION JULY 1685

Upon reading through some of our old journals recently I came across many interesting articles, and in particular these lists previously provided by member Heather Smith.

In the Vol 6 No. 5 October 1985 issue of the *Queensland Family Historian* we published a 'list of the Rebel Prisoners taken at the Battle of Sedgemoor, 5-6 July 1685 who were sentenced at the Bloody Assizes to be transported to the West Indies as slaves on the sugar plantations'.

In Vol 7 No. 5 October 1986 we published a 'List of the Names of the Rebells (sic) that were Executed at Lyme, Bridport, Weymouth, Melcombe Regis, Sherbourn, Pool, Wareham, Exeter, Taunton, and several other places: together with the names of those which were respited till further Orders. Gathered out of several papers formerly printed.' This was printed in 1686. These lists were provided to commemorate the 300th anniversary of the MONMOUTH REBELLION.

Presenting... The Myth of Uncle John

Dr Roger Wilkinson AM's father's 'Uncle John' resided as a mythical figure in the canon of his father's stories. That John had been a well-known physician in early Edwardian and pre-Second World War II Melbourne, had something to do with diabetes and stomach disorders, and was a staunch Methodist, were accepted 'facts.' As an adult physician himself, Roger accidently came across John's entry in the Australian Dictionary of Biography. It made him realise that this man was no myth. He had lived a full and interesting life, not appreciated by this one brother's family. Roger thought his life should be further explored. This is John's story as Roger has been able to piece it together.

SEPTEMBER 18 (1.00 pm)

Presenting...A Home-Grown Monarch of the Queen's State

Dr Gary Bacon AM is an engaging speaker who will give us an appreciation of the testing environments and living conditions which our fore-fathers and -mothers endured. 2024 is the 200th anniversary of the establishment of the penal settlement of Moreton Bay at what is now called Redcliffe. After John Oxley and Allan Cunningham explored Maiwar (the Brisbane River) the settlement was moved to Brisbane in 1825. During their exploration Cunningham named the pine tree growing in thick brush near the river the Brisbane pine. By focusing on *Araucaria cunninghamii*, Dr Gary Bacon will present a history of the Queensland timber industry. That history will include the discovery of the species, the pioneers, industry, timber sales and resources, and forestry plantations.

Presenting... Let's Play - No More Dull Boys Named Jack: Social Life In Pre-Separation Queensland

Back by popular demand, Dr Jennifer Harrison talks abOut the years between February 1842 and December 1859, when the thousands who pioneered the newly opened acres of north-eastern New South Wales embraced opportunities to off-set hard work with stimulating activities to fill their leisure hours. Those who elected to put down roots obviously decided to follow the mantra: "I choose to make the rest of my life the best of my life", rather than "All work and no play makes Jack a dull boy". This presentation is intended to complement last year's contribution which examined their continued communication with the rest of the world. Now we will investigate and identify who instituted social pursuits and how they achieved their aims.
